Pantikapaion was founded by Greek colonists from Miletos in the late seventh century B.C. Situated on the west side of the Cimmerian Bosporos, in what is now the Crimea, it achieved great prosperity through its exploitation of the abundant fisheries of the Straits and the export of wheat from the Crimea. This wealth is attested by its splendid gold coinage which commenced in the mid-fourth century B.C. and by the magnificently furnished rock tombs of its principal citizens in the same period. Later, it was to become a regional capital of the kingdom of Mithradates VI of Pontos (120-63 BC) and later still the seat of the kings of Bosporos (first century BC - fourth century AD). The coinage of Pantikapaion seems to have commenced with silver issues in the latter part of the fifth century B.C., but it is for the beautiful gold staters that the mint is chiefly noted. They depict the head of the god Pan (a pun on the name of the city) and on the reverse the griffin which Herodotos describes as being the guardian of the remote sources of gold. This lot comes from an important period of Greek gold staters from the time of the Mithridatic War（ $88-86$ B．C．）．They were issued by Mithridates VI of Pontus who used the design of the famous issues two centuries earlier of Lysimachos．These staters with the head of Alexander the Great linked him to Alexander，history＇s greatest conqueror．At the age of 18 ，Mithradates embarked on a career of conquest，bringing most of the lands around the Black Sea under his control．These policies brought him into conflict with Rome and he consequently tried to liberate the East from Rome．He quickly defeated the local garrisons and massacred every Roman citizen in Asia（some 80,000 in one night）．Athens welcomed him as a liberator，but the Roman response came in 87 B．C．The Consul L．Sulla with five legions captured Athens and pursued Mithradates back to Asia Minor．Mithradates was fined 2000 talents（ 600,000 gold staters）and returned to Pontus．These gold staters were probably struck during his campaign in Thrace in late 88 to early 87 B．C．to pay his mercenary soldiers．Three cities struck these coins． Alternatively the view has been put forward suggesting that these coins were issued by Brutus in the Civil War of 44－42 B．C．See Celator，January 2000 （pp．22－24）．This may still prove to be the correct interpretation．

Ptolemy VIII Euergetes II（145－116 B．C．）was possibly the last monarch to strike oktodrachms．The gold pieces featured the stereotype head of Arsinoe II on the obverse and the letter K on the obverse field．This letter and type was copied from Arsinoe＇s gold struck under Ptolemy II．The gold oktodrachm under Ptolemy VIII probably passed for 50，000 copper drachms if tendered at full weight．The gold was mined near the border with Ethiopia．

This issue struck officially (senatus consulto) by the two Praetors of 43 B.C., has links to raised legions, two from Africa and one from Italy. It may have been used to pay the troops deployed against Octavian for the defence of Rome in the Summer of 43 . Or alternatively the issue is one aimed at Caesarean soldiers and is an issue by the Senate in the interests of Octavian.

Sybaris was founded by the Achaeans about 720 B.C. It was the richest and most important of the Greek colonies in Italy until its destruction by Croton in 510 B.C. The city was rebuilt in 453 B.C. with the aid of the Poseidonians but was again destroyed five years later by Croton. In 443 B.C. with the help of the Athenians the city arose again but its name was now changed to Thurium. This later city survived into Roman times and became a Roman city with its name changed to Copia. Today the archaeological ruins of all three different named cites can be seen by the interested tourist, each city's remains sits one upon the other.

The city of Heraclea, situated at the head of the Latmic Gulf about fifteen miles east of Miletus, was best known for a cave which was regarded as the tomb of Endymion. Heraclea joined with other Ionian and Aeolian cities in the issue of 'stephanaphori' around 160-150 B.C., its issue being much smaller. Heraclea's obverse type for these broad flanned tetradrachms seems borrowed from the New Style coinage of Athens. The club on the reverse is a symbol of Heraclea, the city's namesake.

This coin is normally known as an issue of the Lydian king Croesus. Throughout the ancient world he was known for his legendary wealth, and it is therefore not surprising to find these most ancient of silver coins associated with this king. The lion is the paramount symbol of royality and as such is appropriate for his Lydian kingdom. According to Herodotus, the Lydians were the first to strike gold and silver coins, but the numismatic evidence is not easily compatable with this statement. Carradice study suggests that this coin is unlikely to have been minted in the lifetime of king Croesus, however Sear assigns them to this ruler c.560-546 B.C. The issue sees the introduction of the world's first bimetallic coinage, gold and silver pieces based on a stater of pure metal weighing about 10.8 grams. This was the initial phase of relatively short duration as, shortly after, the gold was reduced in weight to about 8.00 grams for a stater and the silver siglos replaced the silver stater. Seldom has this company offered the silver stater or double siglos. It is indeed an historic and important coin from the earliest period of coinage in the Western world.

At that time the city was named after the general and called 'Seleukia on the Euphrates.' The population in the city was approximately 80,000 . In 64 B.C. Zeugma was conquered and ruled by Rome and with this shift the name of the city was changed to Zeugma in Greek meaning 'bridge-passage.' During Roman rule, the city became a regional centre. Zeugma was destroyed by the Sassanian King, Shapur I and the invasion was so devasting that Zeugma city was not able to recover for many years. This lot represents an opportunity to acquire a coin from the famous 'Samaria Hoard' published in Meshorer \& Qedar 'Coinage of Samaria in the Fourth Century BCE', Jerusalem, 1991. Every coin in that hoard is illustrated with enlargements and this hoard together with a few other finds became the basis of establishing the existence of a series, of a nation in an era never previously recognised in the published literature. The meaning of the legend (which reads Samaria), remains uncertain, whether it means the city, the province or the state, or a combination of these meanings. By c. 400 B.C, the Samaritans were still considered Jewish and as such were approached by the Jews of Elephantine. The Samaritan high priests and governors in the 5th and 4th century B.C. in the Elephantine documents bear Jewish names. The final separation between the Samaritans and the Jews probably took place a few years after the Samarian hoard's burial (c.346-5 B.C.). Consequently this coin forms part of a collection of Biblical coins.

This coin represents an opportunity to acquire a fine and detailed portrait of Julius Caesar issued in the year of his assassination. The year 44 B.C. marked a turning point in the history of the Roman coinage. Caesar as dictator ordered his effigy to be placed on the silver denarii struck by the four moneyers including Sepullius Macer. This was the first occurance of contemporary portraiture on the Roman coinage, and it marked a major step towards the popular acceptance of the monarchical concept in the Roman State. Although the issue was cut short by Caesar's assassination on the Ides of March, other coins were struck bearing his portrait by the Caesarians. It soon became the practice for the appearance of more portraits of the triumvirs and other contenders for power and, soon, the emperors This type with Venus on the reverse refers to the claim of the Julia gens to be descended from the goddess of love.

Without doubt the Ides of March denarius holds the premier position in ancient Roman coinage for its historical association and symbolism. The bare head of Brutus conveys his deep Republican connections, reminding us that he held the weight of the anti-Caesarian faction on his shoulders. The reverse is a masterfully efficient composition depicting the cap of liberty between two daggers. One dagger represents Brutus himself, while the other alludes to his chief co-conspirator Cassius. The daggers also remind us of the brutal murder of Caesar, while the cap was used by the conspirators as a symbol of their deliverance from the dictator's tyranny. 'Eid Mar' is clearly placed below to cement 15 March 44 B.C. in history. It is the first time that this coin has appeared for public auction and as such, it is an unpublished specimen.

Varus was the General at the Battle of the Teutoburg Forest. P. Quinctilius Varus had a successful career under Augustus until A.D. 9. He had been consul in 13 B.C., along with the future emperor Tiberius and served as governor of Africa, Syria (where he had sent two legions into Judaea to quell local unrest after the territory was made a Roman province) and Germania. It was in Germania that Varus suffered the defeat he is best remembered for. The Cherusci, under their chieftain Arminius, along with other allies, ambushed Varus in the Teutoburg Forest of northwest Germany, and annihilated the XVII, XVIII, and XIX Roman legions in a battle that lasted for three days. Varus, sensing doom, committed suicide, and when Augustus heard of the disaster, it is recorded that he tore his clothes and exclaimed, 'Quintilius Varus, give me back my legions!' No further attempts were made to subdue the Germans beyond the Rhine until the reign of Domitian. This important coin type was last sold (about as fine as this example) in May 2009 in a CNG Electronic Auction 206 (lot 369) for a hammer price of \$1900US.
