There were five people named Sarah Phillips who were sent to Australia as convicts after 1797. They are as follows, (1) Sarah Phillips (AKA Fanny Phillips and also Frances Phillips) arrived at Van Diemen's Land on board the Eliza on 3 November 1829 (sentence Life); (2) Sarah Phillips arrived at Van Diemen's Land on board the Majestic on 1 October 1838 (sentence 7 years); (3) Sarah Phillips arrived at New South Wales and then Van Diemen's Land on board the Mary on 3 June 1823 (sentence 7 years); (4) Sarah Phillips arrived at New South Wales on board the Indispensible in February 1809 (sentence 7 years); (5) Sarah Phillips (AKA Ratcliffe, English and Blake) arrived at New South Wales and Van Diemen's Land on board the Lord Sidmouth on 7 September 1822 (sentence 7 years).

The first annual exhibition was held by the Ballarat Agricultural Society on 27-28 October 1859. The above medal was awarded for Class 20 - Five Fat Ewes - to Mr D.Swan of Burrumbeet. The reported comments regarding this award were, 'This too was a fine clean pen, and with their heavy glossy fleeces, told a tale of what may yet lie in store for the district. We need not say that the prize was readily enough given also in this case.' For this inaugural event only 21 silver medals were awarded.

On 19 June 1861 at a public meeting at Swan's Bridge Hotel, Burrumbeet Mr D.Swan was elected to the committee to manage the farmers' commons for Burrumbeet and Windermere.

Sir Samuel Wilson (1832-1895) was born in Ireland and moved to Victoria in 1852. He worked with the Acclimatization Society by experimenting with ostrich farming and the breeding of Angora goats. He also donated thirty thousand pounds to the University of Melbourne to build a hall and in 1879 the foundation stone was laid for the Gothic Wilson Hall which was destroyed by a fire in 1960. He was knighted in 1875 and became the owner of the largest sheep holding in the world. He purchased Ercildoune homestead in 1873 and retired to England in 1881. He died at his home in Grosvenor Square, London on 11 June 1895.

Barrett & Co. was an English firm with an aerated water works set up in extensive premises nearly opposite the Exhibition Building at Redfern, Sydney, NSW and was awarded a medal in Section 7, Class 476 - fermented drinks and aerated waters.

Mrs H.D.Gant was an Artist in Hair, operating from premises in Toorak Road, South Yarra, Victoria.

Saunders, Cohoun & Coy of Mount Gambier were awarded this medal for their cheese but in addition, they were the pioneers in the business of factory curers and in fact when they exhibited their rolled bacon and mutton hams at the Adelaide Show in September 1888 the judges were so astonished and unbelieving at the quality that they withheld first prize until a company representative went before a Justice of the Peace and made an affidavit that the meat was cured in South Australia.

Purfleet is an aboriginal reserve in the Greater Taree region on the New South Wales mid-north coast's Great Lakes District about 300 kilometres north of Sydney. It was previously the site of an Aboriginal managed reserve, originally known as Sunshine Station, that was established by the Aborigines Protection Board in 1900. The original inhabitants of the Great Lakes district in this area were the Biripi, one of several tribes of the Worimi People, who lived in the area between Tuncurry, Taree and Gloucester.

A news report in The Register, Adelaide, Thursday 12 August 1909, page 7 on the death of Joseph Grundy reads as follows.

The south, particularly Second Valley, has lost one of its most esteemed residents in Mr. Joseph Grundy, who died on Monday. The deceased was the eldest son of Mr. Joseph Grundy, formerly of Lincolnshire, England, who landed in this State in 1853, and finally settled in Second Valley, where he had purchased 900 acres of land in 1867, when his son Joseph was only six years old. He was educated at St. Peter's Collegiate School, and on the death of his father took over the estate. He considerably enlarged the freehold property. He quickly became one of the best known and most popular pastoralists in the south, whose judgment of sheep and horses was greatly valued and sought after for shows. For many years he was President of the Yankalilla, Myponga, and Rapid Bay Agricultural Society. His breed of Lincoln sheep were well known throughout the State, and for five succeeding years he carried off the first prize at the Adelaide Shows with his Lincoln rams. He was a keen sportsman and athlete. For about 20 years Mr. Grundy held the position of Chairman of the Finnis Vale Institute, served a term of years in the Rapid Bay District Council, and was deputy returning officer for the Electoral District of Alexandra. It was greatly due to his energy that the large hall at St. James's Church, Delamere was built, and he was Church Treasurer for many years.

Mohonga Co operated from an estate comprising 175,000 acres of freehold land in the Riverina. In the 1904 season it sheared 145,000 sheep with 76 Wolseley machines operating. It also bred shorthorn cattle.

British education award to Australian, Board of Education for Proficiency in Science, (1907), in bronze (38mm), edge inscribed, 'Samuel T.Farnsworth Applied Mechanics. 1907.', with Board of Education, South Kensington case. *Case toned and with some marks, medal extremely fine.*

Samuel Thomas Farnsworth, born 25 August 1886 at Derby in England, the son of naval commander Ronald Thomas Farnsworth. He came to Australia in 1912 and served in the AIF in WWI. He joined the Water Board in 1928 and was appointed Chief Engineer in 1935. In 1938, as Engineer-in-Chief of the Metropolitan Water Sewerage & Drainage Board he proposed the development of the full supply potential of the Warragamba River through the construction of the Warragamba Dam. Preparations for the construction began in 1942 but unfortunately Samuel did not see its completion in 1960 as he died in 1948.

Awarded Police Medal for Merit and also the King's Police Medal on 14 May 1914. The two medals were awarded, - 'in recognition of bravery displayed in endeavouring to arrest a thief named Beck, at Nundah, on the night of 17th March, 1913, when Beck fired from a revolver, without warning, and the revolver-bullet lodged in Lynch's thigh, where it remains. The injury was a serious one, and has seriously interfered with the Sergeant's general health. Beck was arrested next day, and was subsequently sentenced to five years' imprisonment.'

Peter Lynch, labourer, entered Queensland Police Force on 04Feb1891 at age 26; to Constable 04Feb1891; to Beenleigh 07Jun1893; to Southport 22Dec1897; to Ipswich 26Jul1901; to Nundah 24Dec1906; to Senior Constable 17Dec1910; to Sergeant 01Apr1913; to Rosalie 29Jul1913; to Roma 15Jan1914; superannuated 16Sep1914 at age 60 on recommendation of the Commissioner of Police who gave a glowing account of his service; appointed Temporary Guard at Fanny Bay Gaol 25Feb1921; later became a mounted constable in the Northern Territory; his son Anthony Peter Lynch was appointed Constable in Northern Territory Police 01Feb1928; Peter Lynch appointed Acting Pound Keeper at Darwin Pound 20Jun1928; Retired as a Constable with Northern Territory Police 31Aug1928; Died 26Apr1941 at Glengowie Private Hospital, Red Hill, Brisbane, Queensland.

**First Ever Presentation of
Victorian Police Gold Valour Badges
(Lots 589 and 590)**

Victorian Police Gold Valour Badge, undated (1916), in 9ct gold and enamel by Bridgland & King, with 9ct gold and enamel suspension brooch bar, reverse of medal inscribed, 'Const Downes/5868'. *Good very fine and rare.*

Only 22 gold badges awarded.

The above badge was issued at the first public presentation of gold valour badges which had been instituted in 1916. The presentation was made to 17 police officers by the Chief Secretary, Mr McLeod MLA at Russell Street Barracks on 26 September 1916 with about 250 Constables on parade and in attendance was the Chief Commissioner, Mr A.G.Sainsbury and leading officers of the police force.

When presenting the gold badges Mr McLeod said they were a reward for valour. He said men at the front were receiving VCs for deeds not more worthy, perhaps, than some that were performed by the police, and the Government in adopting the innovation felt that a suitable medal should be given to members of the force when exceptional determination, valour, or devotion to duty was exhibited. He eulogised the marked bravery of several constables who had recently faced desperate armed criminals and succeeded in arresting them.

Constable W.Downes along with Constables F.Bresnan and J.Walsh were each recommended for gold badges for displaying great courage and determination when they arrested John Lane, George Rankin and Ernest Watson on 6 May after an exciting chase in the city of Melbourne. The recommendation was made by Inspecting Superintendent L.Gleeson. The constables saw the three men behaving suspiciously in Flinders Lane and followed them. John Lane fired a revolver but nobody was injured. The chase then became exciting with civilians joining in including one soldier who had been wounded at the Gallipoli landing. The three men were captured and then recognised as desperate young criminals who were suspected of having broken into many shops in Melbourne on Saturday afternoons.

John Lane was charged with having shot with intent to murder, with having a housebreaking implement in his possession, and with warehouse breaking. On the charge of having shot at Constable Downes with intent to murder Lane was committed for trial at the Supreme Court. At the trial Constable W.Downes gave evidence regarding the pursuit and capture of Lane. In addition to the revolver, he said a jemmy was also taken from Lane's pocket when he was arrested.

Francis Bresnan, an engine driver, was born 14 July 1893 at Dunbulbalane (on the Nine Mile Creek about 200km north-northeast of Melbourne), Victoria. He was appointed as a Foot Constable to the Victorian Police Force on 17 December 1914 and discharged as a Constable on 1 November 1923 after 'Refusing Duty' during the police strike, along with many other constables, as recorded in Victoria Police Gazette 13 December 1923. Up until this time his conduct was recorded as good. As well as being awarded the Gold Valour Badge he was also highly commended on 18 March 1918 for stopping at great personal risk a bolting horse in Elizabeth Street, Melbourne on 4 March 1918. The horse had freed itself from a van to which it had been attached and bolted out of Little Bourke Street and collided with another vehicle.

**Bravery Award to 'Bill Proudfoot',
AFL and Collingwood Football Club Legend**



Bill Proudfoot was a police constable but he was also a Collingwood Football Club legend. Born on 11 June 1866 at Kilmore, Victoria he grew to be a very large young man, standing at 184cm and weighing about 101kg. In 1888 while working as a labourer he applied to join the Victorian Police Force and was appointed Constable on 2 July 1888. Over the ensuing years he was promoted to Senior Constable 16.9.1914, Sergeant 2nd Class 18.11.1919, Sergeant 1st Class 5.12.1921, Sub-Inspector 12.1.1924, Inspector 24.2.1925 and Superintendent 14.1.1926. During his service he was posted as follows, Russell Street 2.8.1888, Collingwood 5.4.1889, Kyneton 18.10.1897, Russell Street 20.9.1900, Collingwood 10.10.1900, Clifton Hill 16.2.1903, Echuca East 6.5.1910, Mitcham 23.4.1912, Russell Street 16.9.1914, Clifton Hill 12.1.1920, Russell Street 13.3.1924, Fitzroy 2.7.1924, South Melbourne 7.2.1925, No.3 Div (charge) 23.2.1925, Shepparton 5.10.1925, Central District 26.1.1926, and then he retired 11.6.1926 having reached age 60 and being superannuated. Bill died 11 January 1931 while licensee of the Walls Club Hotel, Werribee.

Bill Proudfoot was a legend of Aussie Rules, playing for the Collingwood Football Club (the Magpies). In the club's first game played at Victoria Park on 7 May 1892 Bill kicked the Collingwood team's second goal. Even in his football games Bill Proudfoot proved to be a lifesaver. On one occasion in a match played against North Melbourne in 1896, angry fans stormed the field to attack the umpire after their team lost to the Magpies. Fortunately for the umpire Bill Proudfoot, a giant of a man, stepped in and shielded the umpire whilst himself taking the bulk of the vicious blows from the fans. The umpire was left relatively unscathed but Proudfoot absorbed so many blows that he collapsed when he reached the dressing room. One of the observers to the melee stated that he thought the umpire would almost surely have been killed if it was not for the heroic intervention of Proudfoot.

Bill Proudfoot only played a nominal number of games during the last few years of his career because the Chief Commissioner of Police decreed that police officers were not allowed to play football. When this happened, Bill was subject to allegations that he was playing, made by a series of letters written by an anonymous person. It was suspected that the writer had a personal grudge against Proudfoot or indeed against the Collingwood Football Club. When the writer complained about Proudfoot not doing his police duties he made a big mistake because Bill Proudfoot was regarded as an exemplary police officer and even rose to the rank of Inspector.

Bill Proudfoot's last game with Collingwood was played against St Kilda in 1906. He had played a total of 190 games. He was Captain in 1898 and part of 1899 and again in 1901; Vice-Captain in 1897; and a Life Member. He also played in VFL representative matches in 1894 (Intercolonial match), 1899 and again in 1902 (v Ballarat).

Citation: William Henry Proudfoot, Russell Street, Melbourne, Senior Constable of Police, aged 53 years, who risked his life in stopping two runaway horses at the corner of Swanston Street and Bourke Street, Melbourne, on December 23, 1918. The horses, attached to a light delivery wagon, were belting out of Swanston Street into Bourke Street, when Proudfoot saw them. He immediately sprang forward and seized the bridle of the near-side horse, and forced the team away from a tram-car, fully loaded with passengers, missing it by inches. He guided the horses between the tram and other vehicles, and pulled them up at the rear of the tram-car, after hanging on to them for 30 to 40 yards.

Edmund Harold Swift was born at Balmain on 5 April 1893, the son of J.H.Swift of Mirfield, Yorkshire, England. He was educated at Sydney High School and Sydney University and was a fellow of the Commonwealth Institute of Accountants. He commenced working with the Public Works Department as a junior clerk in 1910 rising through the ranks. Some of the positions he held included Under Secretary of the Department of Public Works 1934-36, Special Administration Officer of the Health Department 1936-38, Auditor-General 1942-49 and was also on the Board of Control of the United Dental Hospital of Sydney from 1942 and was Chairman of the Public Accountants Registration Board of NSW. Edmund Swift died of a heart attack on 12 November 1949 at only 56 years of age at his residence in Drummoyne, Sydney, NSW. His funeral service was held at St Bede's Church, Drummoyne and then at the Northern Suburbs Crematorium.

KIA in New Guinea**

James Park's playing records stands as 128 games for Carlton in the years 1932-40, premierships player and Victorian representative player in 1938. For many years at Princess Park change-rooms there was hanging on the wall a photo of Jim Park, wearing his number 26 guernsey, making a chest mark after planting his left foot firmly on the back of his Melbourne team opponent, Eric 'Tarzan' Glass, and with his right leg outstretched as he leaps high in the air.

James Park played Aussie Rules for the Carlton Football Club making his debut in 1932 in the 4th round match against Hawthorn at Princes Park. In 1933 he played at centre half-back until the team captain, Frank Gill, was injured and so Park relocated to the last line of defence. When Gill returned from injury, Park moved to the pocket and was an outstanding success. In 1938 Jim Park was a member of the Victorian state team and also was a key element of Carlton's sixth Grand Final victory. Wearing the number 26 guernsey, he turned out for his last game when Carlton played Footscray at Princess Park in the final round of 1940. He then volunteered for overseas war service in March 1941.

James Park was killed leading his men into action in defence of an airfield at Wau in New Guinea and as a tribute to him, one minute's silence was observed for 'Gentleman Jim' as he was known, on 8 May 1943 before the commencement of the first match of the season between Carlton and Richmond at Princess Park. A lone bugler then played the last post. In a further tribute to him, The Sporting Globe Football Annual reported as follows. 'Jim Park had the admiration of officials, players and supporters alike at Carlton, for he played the game hard and fairly. He asked no quarter from anyone and he gave none. Yet with all his battling, he was scrupulously fair - a gentleman on and off the field.'
