This lot come from an important hoard of Greek gold staters from the time of the M ithradatic War (88-86 B.C.). They were issued by M ithradates VI of Pontus who used the design of the famous issues two centuries earlier of Lysimachos. These staters with the head of Alexander the Great linked him to Alexander, history's greatest conqueror. At the age of 18, M ithradates embarked on a career of conquest, bringing most of the lands around the Black Sea under his control. These policies brought him into conflict with R ome and he consequently tried to liberate the East from Rome. Hequickly defeated the local garrisons and massacred every Roman citizen in A sia (some 80,000 in one night). Athens welcomed him as a liberator, but the Roman response came in 87 B.C. TheC onsul Sulla with fivelegions captured Athens and pursued M ithradates back to A sia M inor. M ithradates was fined 2000 talents (600,000 gold staters) and returned to Pontus. These gold staters were probably struck during his campaign in Thrace in late 88 to early 87 B.C. to pay his mercenary soldiers. Three cities struck these coins. Alternatively another view has been put forward suggesting that these coins were issued by Brutus in the Civil war of 44-42 B.C. See Celator, January 2000 (pp. 2224). This may still prove to be the correct interpretation.

It may have been to pay the troops deployed against O ctavian for the defence of Rome in the summer of 43 . Or alternatively the issue is one aimed at C aesarean soldiers and is an issue by the Senate in the interests of O ctavian.

Salus Gen Humani was a legend introduced in the Civil War coinage associated with the revolt of Vindex, combined with a Victory type. This reverse is often interpreted to mean that the Victory of the revolt would be 'the World's Salvation.' M attingly, in BM CRE (p. cxcvi), notes that Suetonius (Galba, 9) provides a comment related to this type: "an appeal comes from Vindex to Galba at Carthago Nova 'to lend his services as champion and leader of the human race.'" With the present issue, presumably struck near the time of his success over Nero, Galba pays homage to this war-cry of Vindex. The Victory type gives way to one of the 'Fortune of the H uman Race', who is sacrificing in gratitude for the deliverance of the Romans from the emperor N ero.

M ost examples of this period which come from this mint are worn coins. R utter records five examples only from this diecombination. Cumae (modern Cuma) was the first Greek colony on the mainland of Italy (M agna Graecia) according to Strabo, it is an ancient city located about 12 miles ( 19 km ) west of N aples. Cumae founded a number of colonies and grew to be a great power. It repulsed Etruscan and Umbrian attacks, but fell in the late 5th cent. BC to the Samnites. Cumae supported Rome in the second century $B C$ and adopted Roman culture which lead ultimately to its inhabitants becoming Roman citizens.
