SPORTING & GENERAL MEDALS, BADGES & AWARDS (PART 1)

ART (1878 - 1951)

Arthur Dewhurst Riley was born in Accrington, Lancashire, England, on 18 February 1860, the son of Reuben Dewhurst Riley, a master house-painter, and his wife, Jane Miller. Arthur attended local schools before going to the National Art Training School in South Kensington (later the Royal College of Art), London, from 1874 to 1881. After graduating with high honours he immediately emigrated to Australia, arriving late in 1881 or early in 1882. On 10 September 1882 he married Grace Nancy Dewhurst in Melbourne; they were to have two children - a boy and a girl. Riley became an instructor in a large art school and was appointed an art examiner for New South Wales.

In 1885 Arthur and Grace Riley moved to Wellington, New Zealand, where Arthur had been appointed drawing master for the Wellington Education Board; this allowed him to begin special technical classes supported by fees. As a result, in 1886 Riley was able to start Wellington's first school of design occupying three rooms in a Featherston Street building. It was an immediate success. Riley trained teachers to draw, and offered a wide range of classes to the fee-paying public. Courses included the study of the great masters, modelling, house decoration, paper hanging, casting, wood and stone carving, and conventional painting in oils and watercolours. In later years many more courses were added, such as commercial subjects, mathematics, English and even Latin.

The first year set the pattern for the future. The school expanded rapidly, although it was always underfunded, and accommodation was always inadequate. Teachers were underpaid and mostly untrained. Courses were varied and flexible, changing to meet local needs, so that in spite of the difficulties community support was strong.

Riley soon impressed people with his administrative abilities, ideas and youthful energy, and was respected both as an educator and as a person. Always well dressed, he did not fit the stereotype of artist as rebel. In appearance he was distinguished, with a smartly trimmed beard and a handlebar moustache, but no hair - he was bald by 30. As an artist he was interested in industrial design rather than conventional landscapes, and he was one of the few who insisted that Maori motifs and the local environment should be reflected in the work of New Zealand artists.

Riley became a leading advocate of planned technical education, arguing that vocational training should not be left to chance if New Zealand was to compete with other countries. He strongly opposed the narrow academic bias of secondary school education. After visiting England in 1898 Riley urged the Liberal government to set up technical colleges for able young people who could find neither work nor places in the exclusive secondary schools. He recommended better funding systems for technical education, the establishment of agricultural colleges, the teaching of applied design as well as fine arts, the introduction of manual instruction and homecraft courses, and that apprentices be given recognition for their evening-class studies.

Riley's views had a direct influence on the Manual and Technical Instruction Act of 1900 which provided more resources for vocational training and gave technical schools the right to teach almost any subject. The act also led to the conversion in 1905 of the Wellington Technical School (the new name of his Wellington School of Design) into New Zealand's first coeducational multi-purpose day school.

In 1903 Riley was at the high point of his career. His achievements were widely respected and his example was widely followed. However, he decided it was time to put personal and family interests ahead of his commitment to what was a financially unrewarding profession. He resigned that year and was never again involved in educational activities. Instead he began a new and successful career as a businessman, becoming a partner in a company importing engineering and electrical equipment. Around 1910 Riley formed his own importing firm and was the sole New Zealand agent for about 20 British manufacturing firms. In partnership with G. H. Grapes he obtained the New Zealand agency for the Albion Motor Car Company of Glasgow. They represented several other automotive and tyre companies, with sufficient success to open branches in Dunedin, Christchurch and Auckland.

Arthur Riley died at sea near Pitcairn Island on board the Rotorua on 29 August 1929, returning from a trip to England. Grace Riley died at Wellington in 1947.



Cecil Fletcher Kelly (1878-1954)

Born in Christchurch, in 1878, Cecil Kelly studied in Christchurch under P Van der Velden and in Europe. He married fellow artist Elizabeth Abbott in 1908 and they settled in New Brighton. Their home became a meeting place for artists. A teacher and landscape painter in oils, Kelly exhibited with the Canterbury Society of Arts and in the UK with the Royal Academy. He died in 1954, and his work is represented in major New Zealand galleries.

Bessie Christie was an Auckland artist about whose life only the sketchiest details are known. Even her death date is uncertain.

In 1933 she was an exhibiting member of the Auckland Society of Arts; she taught art at Takapuna Grammar School 1935- 40 and was an exhibiting member of the Rutland Group.

Bombardier Bessie Christie was a driver in the Women's Auxiliary Army Corps during World War II and works by her were included in the 1944 Artists in Uniform exhibition. At a time when most New Zealand artists were recording the landscape in an attempt to create a national art, Bessie Christie devoted her talent to recording the contemporary social life of the people of Auckland. As such her paintings are an almost unique record of a neglected subject area.

Bessie (Elizabeth) Christie is an elusive figure. She was born in Wellington and received her secondary education at Elam School of Art in Auckland. Unlike her contemporary May Smith she did not pursue further studies at an art school in England but remained in Auckland where she taught art at Takapuna Grammar School. After its foundation in 1936 she was an active member of the Rutland Group which had been formed by a group of ex-Elam students in order to pursue a more adventurous line in painting than that favoured by the then highly conservative Auckland Society of Arts. During the war Bessie Christie served with the Women's Auxiliary Army Corps. Throughout the 1950s she exhibited at the Auckland Society of Arts in the company of such contemporaries as A.Lois White, May Smith, Helen Brown and Frances Hunt. Unlike many other painters of the time she struck out on an original path refusing to paint the rather gloomy, empty landscapes which were then in fashion, instead specialising in cityscapes filled with people.

She made sketches at social occasions such as the annual Elam Arts balls and later worked them up into paintings in which individual characters were clearly recognisable. Ironically it was probably this very ability as a recorder of social activities which was responsible for her failing at the time to achieve the reputation of her landscape painting contemporaries.

Bessie Christie is a good example of a talented artist who managed to surmount the obstacles of a conventional art education and to maintain a fresh approach to subject matter in the face of prevailing fashion. In recent years her work, though rarely found, has become increasingly sought after because of its originality (Courtesy - Fletcher Trust Collection).

"Akaroa Athletic Sports

These sports were held on Monday, and were from first to last a success. The weather was all that could be desired, the ground was in excellent order, and the arrangements made by the Committee were capital. Mr Penlington kindly lent his shop as a dressing room for the contestants, and here we may say, that we hope in the not very distant future to hear of steps being taken to have something in the shape of a pavillion erected on the ground itself.

That the handicappers had done their duty well, was shown by the close finishes and large fields. Mr Phillips had a booth on the ground and did good business, but we hardly think there were so many pecple present as usual. This is to be ascribed to the many other amusements going on in the Bays on Easter Monday and also to the fact that the milking season not being yet over, the farmers and their families cannot get away so easily as they can on the Queen's Birthday. Nevertheless, there must have been 700 or 800 people present and undoubtedly the alteration made in the holiding of the Athletic gathering at Easter instead of the Queen's Birthday will be a success. The absence of a band was much to be regretted, and we wish the local players could pull themselves together and supply a real want on these occasions, and render us independant of expensive outside aid. The Hon. Sec, Starter, Judges, Timekeepers, members of the Committee, and in fact all concerned did their work very well and heartily. The town was full of visitors, most of whom paid the ground a visit, and the Lavaud Street footpath, the seats at the tennis ground, the verandahs of the houses opposite, and every other point of vantage was crowded with spectators. A course had been roped in opposite the Lavaud street palings, so many of the events and all the finishes in the running races could be seen without obstruction by those standing on the footpath outside......

The races were well contested, the time in the flat races being quite up to the mark considering the ground, and the jumping and vaulting being excellent. Mr Pearson, the photographer, kindly gave three cabinet photos to the winner of the Mile Walk. The cup for the Mile Run, a very nice one, was appropriated by Livingston; and Fitzpatrick was the hero of the day, making no less than 11-1/2 points and carrying off the medal for the greatest number. The result of the Grand Handicap was as follows:- W.Lee... ... 7 points; Jas.Fitzpatrick.... 6-1/2 points; F.Leonardo... 3 points".

The Auckland Amateur Athletic and Cycling Club Carnival was held on March 10, 1894. 4,000 were present, including Lord and Lady Glasgow and their entourage. The 100 yards handicap was won by A.Jones (6-1/2 yards); the 300 yards ladies' bracelet was won by A.Jones (15 yards).

It is believed that Mr Jones was the first man in New Zealand to run 100 yards in 10 seconds, but this cannot be verified.

Annie Elizabeth Abbott was born at Knightstown, Christchurch, New Zealand, on 12 April 1877, the eldest of four children of Maud Laura Mason and her husband, Thomas George Abbott, a nurseryman. She was educated locally and, in 1891, while still at St Albans Main School, began attending Saturday classes at Canterbury College School of Art.

From 1894 until 1900 Elizabeth, as she was known, studied for student's and art teacher's certificates at the School of Art and received several scholarships and prizes. Like many of her contemporaries she was much influenced by the work and philosophy of Petrus van der Velden, who stressed the importance of drawing after nature, believing this to be the source of love, knowledge and understanding. However, she never became one of his pupils. At the conclusion of her studies Abbott joined the staff of the School of Art and held a position there from 1901 until the end of 1904. From early 1905 she taught privately at her studio in Hereford Street.

Between 1899 and 1902 Elizabeth Abbott participated in student competitions held by the Canterbury Society of Arts, winning two bronze and two silver medals for painting and modelling from life. In 1903 she was elected a working member of the society and was to exhibit almost every year until 1946. From 1937 until 1946 she was also to serve on its council.

For many years Elizabeth Abbott had a close friendship with fellow student artist Cecil Fletcher Kelly, and on 31 December 1908 they married at Christchurch. Throughout their married life they were inseparable, painting landscapes together at every opportunity. Favourite painting places were Kaikoura, Moana in Westland, Lyttelton Harbour and occasionally the southern lakes of Otago. They lived at the Hereford Street studio until 1912 then moved to Richmond Terrace, New Brighton. Although she often painted landscapes, Elizabeth Kelly continued to paint and exhibit figurative work and her reputation as a portraitist grew. In 1920 she received a commission from the New Zealand government to paint a portrait of Sergeant H. J. Nicholas, VC.

That same year Elizabeth and Cecil made a decision to travel. By early 1921 they were living in London, painting and visiting artists' studios and galleries. The summer months were spent in Cornwall. After an extended visit to Paris, where they also painted, they returned to London before making the sea voyage to New Zealand. They arrived back in Christchurch during January 1922 and within a few months moved to a rented flat in Montreal Street, which was to remain their home.

The experience of visiting Britain and Europe had broadened Elizabeth Kelly's approach to academic naturalism, and her 'interpretations', as she termed her portraits, became more lively in design and colour. During the 1920s she consolidated her reputation as a portraitist and became popular for her paintings of elegant, fashionable young women of Canterbury society. Although she had exhibited regularly at art society exhibitions throughout New Zealand since the early twentieth century, it was not until 1924, when one of her paintings was included in the British Empire Exhibition, Wembley, that her work was seen overseas. In 1931 she began exhibiting in London at the Royal Academy of Arts and the Royal Society of Portrait Painters, and in Edinburgh at the Royal Scottish Academy. The following year she exhibited for the first time at the Paris Salon of the Societe des artistes français, receiving honourable mention for her portrait of Edith Bryant. A silver medal was awarded at the 1934 Salon for her portrait of Edith May. This was one of the highest official awards achieved by a New Zealand artist. By 1933 she was being described as 'New Zealand's foremost woman portrait painter'. Much of this acclaim can be attributed to overseas successes. Over the next few years she continued to exhibit in leading galleries.

Official recognition in New Zealand came in 1938 when she was appointed a CBE. Further recognition overseas came in 1940 with the purchase of her portrait of Professor James Park for the Scottish National Portrait Gallery, and in 1945 when her work was included in the British Art of Today exhibition. Elizabeth Kelly died at Christchurch on 4 October 1946, survived by her husband, Cecil. There were no children of the marriage.

Tall of stature, Kelly was of a dignified and sensitive character. As an artist she was extremely self-critical, maintaining the highest standards of professionalism, but she was generous in her help to young artists. Although well regarded as a landscape painter, her major contribution to New Zealand art lies in the way she revitalised formal portraiture in the 1920s and 1930s. A traditionalist, she followed closely the English school of portrait painting, which made her work readily acceptable both in New Zealand and overseas. Within her generation she gained more recognition abroad than any other New Zealand woman artist.

"Davis, Ernest Hyam 1872 - 1962: -

A brewery baron for half a century, and the liquor trade's master tactician against the prohibition movement, Ernest Hyam Davis exerted enormous influence at the highest political levels. He combined this with a complex business career and an unbounded enthusiasm for yachting, racing and philanthropy.

He was born in Nelson on 17 February 1872 (registered simply as Hyam), the son of Moss Davis, an immigrant Jewish merchant, and his wife, Leah Jacobs. He attended Bishop's School in Nelson, but completed his education at Auckland Grammar School after his father joined, then acquired, the Auckland liquor firm of Hancock and Company. Ernest disliked academic study and his final report described him as 'utterly incorrigible', although he subsequently attended evening classes at Auckland University College. His first position was with the ironware merchants William McArthur and Company, but he soon quit this for a brief stint working in Brisbane and a walking tour of Fiji.

In 1892 Davis joined his father's firm as a director along with his brother Eliot, and three years later added the directorship of another family acquisition, the Captain Cook Brewery, then the largest in New Zealand. When Moss Davis retired in 1910 to England, the two brothers took charge of Hancock and Company. With his portfolio of controlling shares, Ernest was appointed managing director, a position he retained until his death. On 2 August 1899, at Auckland, he married Marion Mitchell. They were to have a son and a daughter. At the same time, Davis evidently found ample opportunity for extra-marital affairs.

As well as managing his brewery interests, Davis was prominent in the liquor trade's efforts to counter the flourishing prohibition movement. Between 1894 and 1910 the number of licensed premises slumped from 1,719 to 1,257, and in 1908 Hancock and Company lost 14 Auckland hotels without compensation. The 1911 triennial liquor poll, at which prohibition was almost carried, induced the brewery interests to intensify lobbying, and funds were channelled to political supporters.

Davis adeptly orchestrated this flow, and capitalised on the fact that among his brewery's employees for a decade after 1908 was a rising labour activist, Michael Joseph Savage. Davis materially assisted the New Zealand Labour Party over a lengthy period, and probably foresaw that it would ultimately emerge as a governing force. He lodged securities for gaoled agitators during the 1912 Waihi miners' strike, provided a hotel for John A. Lee to manage when he lost his parliamentary seat in 1928, and made standing donations to Labour candidates' election funds until his death. His support was not based solely on cynical commercial motives.

From his 30s Davis showed an enormous capacity for a multitude of interests. He was prominent among the early members of the Auckland Rowing Club, and was a foundation member of the Auckland Orphans' Club. In 1909 Davis became mayor of the small borough of Newmarket, and was re-elected in 1910. Moving on to Auckland City, he was elected as an independent councillor in 1915 and served until 1920, when he resigned, only to regain office in 1921. Later it was estimated that he held significant positions in at least 94 sporting and social bodies, 11 of them at the national level, including the presidency of the New Zealand Football Association. He also served on the board of management of the Auckland Hebrew Congregation.

Davis played a pivotal role in the 1923 formation of New Zealand Breweries Limited from 10 existing companies, but this did not prevent his deepening immersion in local body affairs. In the 1920s and 1930s he served on the Auckland Harbour Board, Auckland Hospital Board, Auckland Metropolitan Fire Board and Auckland and Suburban Drainage Board. He crowned his municipal career by narrowly winning the mayoralty of Auckland in 1935 as the Auckland Citizens' and Ratepayers' Association candidate and, as Sir Ernest (he was knighted in 1937), comfortably secured re-election in 1938. Taking office at the end of the depression, he initially stressed economy and prudence, but later oversaw construction of the municipal bus terminal and parking station, Scenic Drive, and the Chamberlain Park Golf Course. In the early phases of the Second World War he was at the forefront of patriotic endeavour, but chose to retire from the mayoralty in 1941, basking in valedictories that hailed his calm progressiveness, executive capacity and exceptional popularity.

Belying his 70 years, Davis then resumed an active business life, holding many directorships including that of the Auckland Meat Company, Bycroft Limited, Kawerau Hotel, and the Northern Steam Ship Company. He chaired the Devonport Steam Ferry Company for 20 years and for a similar period was a trustee of the Auckland Savings Bank, serving as chairman in its centennial year (1947). In 1960 he became a foundation director of the New Zealand Distillery Company.

With trusted lieutenants to manage his brewery and hotel empire, Davis was free to indulge his sporting and cultural interests. About 1939 he bought a Rotorua farm, which subsequently became a model for a town-milk supply enterprise. An inveterate yachtsman, he owned several notable craft and had life membership of the Royal New Zealand Yacht Squadron conferred on him in 1957. He became an avid racehorse owner, the success of his stable making him the leading stakeswinner four times in the mid 1950s. He commissioned for the city portraits of Queen Elizabeth II, Lord Freyberg and Sir Edmund Hillary.

Late in life Davis distributed much of his immense wealth in the form of widespread charitable benefactions. He also gifted Motukorea (Browns Island) to the citizens of Auckland, established the superb medical library at Auckland Hospital in honour of his wife (who had died in May 1955), and funded the construction of the Tiritiri Matangi Island shipping light. To celebrate his 90th birthday, the Auckland City Council hosted a formal civic reception. He died on 16 September 1962 at his central city residence in Waterloo Quadrant, survived by his daughter.

Although one of New Zealand's most successful and eminent businessmen and a peerless political manipulator, Ernest Davis always regarded himself as a man of the people, obliged to set an example of good citizenship. About the virtues of Auckland he confessed a feeling near to adoration. His ability to juggle an astounding array of business, sporting and social priorities never faltered, and he was at the centre of civic life in Auckland for over 50 years."

George Woods Humphrey was a well known and respected figure in the early days of international aviation. He was the first General Manager of Handley-Page Transport and when his struggling company was merged with several others into Imperial Airways in 1924 he emerged as the top executive. His inventiveness and drive pushed Imperial to a leading position in world aviation until the war's barriers stopped everything. Imperial is still remembered as the airline that so strongly advocated the use of the flying boat as a safe means of long range air transport. The airline fostered a leading role for the British airframe industry in this area.

G.E. Woods Humphrey's presence in New Zealand and as Chairman, N.Z. Council of the Institute of Transport is not well documented and is worthy of further research.

Sir Charles Edward Kingsford Smith MC, AFC (9 February 1897 - 8 November 1935), often called by his nickname Smithy, was an early Australian aviator. In 1928, he earned global fame when he made the first trans-Pacific flight from the United States to Australia. He also made the first non-stop crossing of the Australian mainland, the first flights between Australia and New Zealand, and the first eastward Pacific crossing from Australia to the United States. He also made a flight from Australia to London, setting a new record of 10.5 days.

In 1933, Seven Mile Beach, New South Wales, was used by Sir Charles Kingsford Smith as the runway for the first commercial flight between Australia and New Zealand.
