Competition societies gave young and older performers alike an opportunity to compete for prizes in the fields of drama, oratory, music and elocution. The first society was established in Auckland in 1901 and by the 1910s the societies were flourishing all over the country. The competitions were also enjoyable for spectators and the first annual competitions society festival, held in Wellington in 1911, was advertised as the 'biggest festival ever held in the Southern hemisphere.' The festival ran for two weeks and attracted competitors from all over the country. It also included a physical drill, with the Boy Scouts showing off their skills in first aid and bridge building.

"LABOUR DAY SPORTS, SATURDAY'S GATHERING AT NEWTOWN PARK

The Labour Day Demonstration this year has been somewhat of a failure, principally on account of the adverse weather conditions. On 25th October (Labour Day), rain caused a postponement of the sports, and on Saturday, when the gathering was held at Newtown Park, the meteorological conditions were little better. This was very disappointing to a most energetic committee, which had worked hard under the secretary (Mr.L.M.A.Rearden) an able organiser. Although it did not rain, the sky was overcast, and a strong nor'wester - quite typical of Wellington at this time of the year - made matters very unpleasant. Under the circumstances a poor attendance of the public was only to be expected. The few who attended had a real good time, particularly the children, who are always well catered for at the Labour Sports. Toys were given away freely, and there were lollie scrambles and various other attractions bound to please the small child. A very lengthy sports programme had been arranged for boys and girls, men and women, and there were some keen contests. The Highland dancing also created considerable interest. Two bands were present, the Waterside Workers and the Pipe Band. Among those present during the afternoon were Sir Joseph and Lady Ward and the Mayor (Mr.J.P.Luke).

SHEARING COMPETITION

Special interest was taken in the sheep-shearing contest, which resulted :- Machine-shearing - Leyland 1st for all-round work and for speed, Blakeley 2, and Townsend 3.

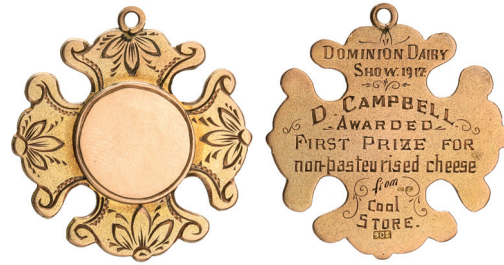

Still in operation today, the first show was held in 1908 and is run by the Waikato Winter Show Association. The event was initially formed by the businessmen of Hamilton City in order to connect the Agricultural Community with the city folk. It had a strong educational focus and was considered a celebration of the various skills of the Waikato people. The Waikato Winter Show also served to showcase the products hewn from the animals and land of the Waikato Region. Butter, cheese, vegetables, sewing, knitting, and preserves all played an important part in the exhibits.

Herbert James 'Burt' Munro (Bert in his youth; 25 March 1899 - 6 January 1978) was a New Zealand motorcycle racer, famous for setting an under-1,000 cc world record, at Bonneville, 26 August 1967. This record still stands; Munro was 68 and was riding a 47-year-old machine when he set his last record.

Working from his home in Invercargill, he worked for 20 years to highly modify the 1920 Indian motorcycle that he had bought that same year. Munro set his first New Zealand speed record in 1938 and later set seven more. He travelled to compete at the Bonneville Salt Flats, attempting to set world speed records. During his ten visits to the salt flats, he set three speed records, one of which still stands.

His efforts, and success, are the basis of the motion picture *The World's Fastest Indian* (2005), starring Anthony Hopkins, and an earlier 1971 short documentary film *Burt Munro: Offerings to the God of Speed*, directed by Roger Donaldson. William Albert Fairhurst CBE (21 August 1903, Alderley Edge, England - 13 March 1982, Howick, New Zealand) was an English-born bridge designer and international chess master. He was highly accomplished in both disciplines and for many years successfully divided his time between two careers. He was awarded the CBE for his services to engineering, and in chess he was several times champion of Scotland, gaining the title of International Master in 1951.

Born in Alderley Edge, Cheshire, Fairhurst was thirteen when he taught himself to play chess from a collection of books at the family home. During this developmental stage, he was inspired by the teachings of Siegbert Tarrasch and consequently his playing style was based, for the most part, on dogmatic strategic concepts. By eighteen, he was Cheshire County Champion and a little later, moved to Lancashire, where he established a reputation as one of the leading players in the North of England. As an amateur, he had little opportunity to play in international tournaments, but he did compete at Scarborough in 1927, finishing second, tied with Frederick Yates, ahead of several recognised masters including Efim Bogoljubov, Sir George Thomas and Victor Buerger. Notably, he defeated not only the hugely experienced Bogoljubov, but also the first-prize winner, Edgard Colle. It was around this time, in his twenties, that he edited a well-respected games section in the magazine Chess Amateur.

In 1931, he went to live in Scotland and laid the foundations for a chess boom north of the border, winning the Scottish championship a record eleven times between 1932 and 1962. A gifted blindfold player, he held a twelve-board simultaneous blindfold exhibition in 1932 at the Glasgow Polytechnic Club, winning nine games and drawing three. A year later, he drew a six-game match with the then Austrian master Erich Eliskases, a player of noted strength and very much a rising star in world chess. In 1937, Fairhurst won a fiercely contested British Championship in Blackpool.

Playing team chess, he represented Great Britain many times, in a series of matches with Czechoslovakia, the Netherlands and Russia, held between 1937 and 1954. Playing board one, he spearheaded the Scottish Chess Olympiad team on six occasions between 1933 and 1968; his victims included the Danish champion and future world championship contender Bent Larsen, who was close to his peak. In 1947, he played in a radio match with Australia and at the end of the year, achieved a creditable fifth place at the Hastings International Chess Congress of 1947/48. His next performance at Hastings was similarly praiseworthy, finishing the 1948/49 event in a tie for fourth place.

In 1950, chess organisers took advantage of the fact that the leading players of England, Scotland, Canada, New Zealand and South Africa were all gathered in Britain at the same time. An impromptu first (unofficial) Commonwealth Chess Championship was arranged and held in Oxford. Fairhurst won the event, ahead of Daniel Yanofsky, Robert Wade and Wolfgang Heidenfeld, among others. He later lost a match to Wade in Glasgow in 1953.

As the best of his playing days drew to a close, Fairhurst continued to give generously of his time and money, for the furtherance of Scottish Chess. He was made President of the Scottish Chess Association (SCA) from 1956 and forged new links with the British Chess Federation. At the end of his allotted tenure, he took control of the SCA, appointed himself President and retained the right to choose who joined him on the board. For a while, this was an improvement over the muddled state that the SCA had previously endured. Later however, his influence became overbearing and following a controversy about team selection for the Lugano 1968 Olympiad, where he tried to block the inclusion of a player, he was deposed and asked to appoint a successor.

His business interests caused him to move to New Zealand around 1970. While there, he played in the New Zealand Chess Championship and decided that he liked the country so much, it would make an ideal venue for his retirement. He competed at the Nice 1974 Olympiad for his new adopted country, playing board one and registering a 40% score; an outstanding result for a seventy-year-old.

After building a career and reputation for himself in civil and structural engineering, Fairhurst became the senior partner in his own engineering consultancy, W.A.Fairhurst and Partners. Specialising in bridge design, the largest and most prestigious of his projects was the design of the new Tay Road Bridge, which crosses the Tay estuary and links north-east Fife with the city of Dundee. It was, at the time, the longest river crossing in Europe, measuring approximately 1.4 miles. Costing £6 million, the bridge was opened in 1966 at a ceremony performed by HRH The Queen Mother. Other notable projects included the Kingston Bridge, Glasgow (1970) and the Queen Elizabeth II Metro Bridge (1980) in Newcastle-upon-Tyne. There were many other bridges in Scotland and also in New Zealand, where he was lured to advise on a particularly difficult structure in the early 1970s, and where he made a home for his retirement.

For his engineering achievements, he received a doctorate, and through The Queen's honours list, a CBE. At the pinnacle of his profession, Fairhurst was honoured with the Presidency of the Scottish Branch of the Institution of Structural Engineers. In his time, he was the author of the text Arch Design Simplified and a member of the Royal Fine Art Commission for Scotland.

His engineering company continues to thrive today, working out of 15 principal offices and employing 500 staff. Today it is one of the largest private consultancy companies in the UK, trading since 1 January 2012 under the name Fairhurst.

"OBITUARY, MR FRANK CYRIL YEOMAN

The death occurred on Sunday of Frank Cyril Yeoman, prominent farmer in the Oporirao district and well known throughout the Bay of Plenty. Born at Devonport, Auckland, in 1874, the late Mr Yeoman was one of the first ten scholars to be granted free places for secondary education and he attended the Auckland Grammar School until he went to Oporirao, in 1890, to learn farming. Four years later he purchased his own property at Waiotahi. In 1898 he married Miss Mary Blomfield, of Auckland, and in 1901, a few years after the Oporirao Estate had been cut up, he bought the present property. Yeoman was for many years a member of the Whakatane County Council and Bay of Plenty Hospital Board. Among his other connections, he was a director of the Oporirao Dairy Company from its inception and was a former president of the Whakatane and Rangitaiki A. and P. Association. He was associated with St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church Taneatua, being one of the original elders and acting as choirmaster for many years. For years he conducted the Sunday School at Oporirao. He is survived by his widow and a family of eight, Major Gilbert Yeoman, N.Z.M.R., at present in camp at Ngaruawahia, resides at Taneatua, Lieutenant Alfred Yeoman is with the 3rd Echelon, Lieutenant Allan Yeoman is in Britain with the 2nd Echelon and Mr Selwyn Yeoman resides in Whakatane; Mrs A. K. Prince, of Taneatua; Mrs A. E. Hill, of Murupara; Mrs S. Clinton-Williams, Mission Bay, Auckland, and Miss Elsie Yeoman, of Taneatua. There are 19 grand-children."

The Ratana movement is a religion and pan-iwi political movement founded by Tahupotiki Wiremu Ratana in early 20th-century New Zealand. The te Haahi Ratana has its headquarters at the settlement of Ratana pa near Whanganui.

The main symbol (tohu) of the church is the five-pointed star and crescent moon, the whetu marama (shining light), worn on the lapels of morehu (the scattered remnant, Ratana followers) and at pivotal points on church buildings. The golden crescent moon (symbolising enlightenment) can face different parts of the coloured star: blue represents Te Matua (the Father), white is Te Tama (the Son), red is Te Wairua Tapu (Holy Spirit) and purple is Nga Anahera Pono. Te whetu marama represents the kingdom of light or Maramatanga, standing firm against the forces of darkness (makutu).

On the 8th of November 1918 Ratana saw a vision, which he regarded as divinely inspired, asking him to preach the gospel to the Maori people, to destroy the power of the tohunga, and to cure the spirits and bodies of his people.

Until 1924 he preached to increasingly large numbers of Maori and established a name for himself as the 'Maori Miracle Man'. Initially, the movement was seen as a Christian revival, but it soon moved away from mainstream churches. On 31 May 1925, Te Haahi Ratana (The Ratana Church) was formally established as a separate church which was formally registered on 21 July 1925, and its founder was acknowledged as the bearer of Te Mangai or God's Word and Wisdom.

"PRESBYTERIAN OFFICE BEARERS' ASSOCIATION

The first-quarterly meeting of the executive of the Presbyterian 'Office-bearers' Association was held on Saturday afternoon in Holmes Hall when there were thirteen present. After routine business was transacted, Rev. H. Davies, of Canton, addressed the meeting, urging a strong appeal on behalf of his district (Yun Woh), one of the parishes of the Canton Village Missions. Mr Davies supplied a considerable amount of information regarding the present, condition of affairs in China, showing that there was a great upheaval going on and that China was to a large extent moulding itself on western lines. China would be either a power for good or for evil, in her future, according as the Christian Church directed her energies. To this effect the Christian Churches of China were uniting so that together they could make a stronger impression on the rising generation. The "isms" were being sunk in favour of a strong united Christian church. Yun Woh the centre of a district with a population of 200,000, and the Village Mission wished to add to the existing buildings accommodation for a girls' school, to remodel and enlarge the present building for a boys' school, to turn the present missionary's house into a dwelling for an unmarried woman worker with girl boarders, and to erect a new pastor's house on land already purchased. The cost of these works was estimated to be £1850, £350 of which was already in hand in China, and £250 had so far been promised as the result of Mr Davies' efforts in New Zealand. The latter sum represented only about two months' work as up to two months ago Mr Davies had no authority to make an appeal. After the meeting it was unanimously decided that the executive recommend that a special appeal be made by cards and circulars to the churches of the Presbytery on behalf of Mr Davies' work and that the thanks of the meeting be extended to Mr Davies for his address".

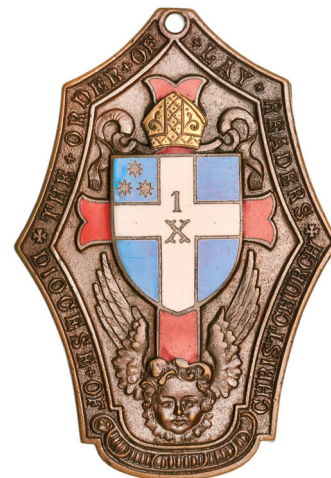

Lord Hawke led a cricket team of ten amateurs and two professional players on a tour of Australia and New Zealand from November 1902 until March 1903. After an opening game in San Francisco, the tour began of eighteen matches - seven of them considered first-class - in New Zealand followed by three further first-class games in Australia. Hawke's team was the first to tour Australasia with New Zealand as the primary destination and, as was the norm at the time, was privately run and funded. The Australian leg of the tour was a 'profit making venture', however the games in New Zealand were scheduled at the behest of the New Zealand Cricket Board in order to raise the profile of cricket in the country. Two of them were against a New Zealand cricket team, before its international Test status. The inclusion of such games on the tour were considered 'a sign that cricket in New Zealand was starting to be taken more seriously, and a move towards official international status was possible.'

Hawke's team was a strong one, including Pelham Warner, Bernard Bosanquet and Frederick Fane, and it was victorious in all eighteen matches of the New Zealand tour, though it was defeated in two of the three matches in Australia.

Charles Stewart 'Stewie' Dempster (born 15 November 1903 in Wellington - 14 February 1974) was a former New Zealand cricketer and coach. As well as representing New Zealand, he also played for Wellington, Scotland, Leicestershire and Warwickshire.

Born to Scottish parents Charles Dempster and Eliza Jemima Weavers in 1903 Dempster lived the first three decades of his life in Wellington, nearby to the local cricket ground the Basin Reserve. Developing an early interest in the game Dempster played for the Wellington Boys' Institute team in his youth and was encouraged by his father to score hundreds, being rewarded with 5 shillings from him for each one he scored. In his most prolific season he scored nine centuries in ten innings with the remaining innings scoring 99 and gaining the attention of the local provincial selectors.

Dempster made his first first class appearance for Wellington against Canterbury at the Basin Reserve over new year 1921/1922 scoring 10 and 1. Dempster first toured with New Zealand in 1927, when no Test matches were played, and headed the touring team's first class batting averages. He was a surprise choice for the tour, being selected more for his performances in second class cricket. In the 1929-30 MCC tour of New Zealand Dempster and Mills put on a New Zealand record first innings stand of 276 for the first wicket, which remained the highest for New Zealand until 1972. In the 1931 New Zealand tour of England he averaged 59.26 and scored 120 in the Test at Lord's. In 1932 he was listed as one of the Wisden Cricketers of the Year.

He made his final Test appearance against the 1932/1933 England team scoring 83 not out.

Dempster moved to England appearing in one first class match for Lindsay Parkinson's XI in 1933 and once for Scotland in 1934. He settled in England from 1935 being contracted by the Leicestershire millionaire Sir Julien Cahn to play for his private team. Dempster qualified for Leicestershire, captaining the team from 1936 to 1938, although playing irregularly in 1938 and 1939. In 1938-39, he toured New Zealand with Cahn's team.

Dempster appeared for the County scratch sides during the war but left the staff when the war ended. He played three times for Warwickshire in 1946 before returning to New Zealand to become a coach. He was selected to play for New Zealand in a one-off Test in Christchurch against England, but withdrew due to an eye injury the night before play. The match ended in a draw. Dempster made his final appearance for Wellington against Auckland at Eden Park in January 1948 scoring 7 and 41.

Dempster has the distinction of having the second highest Test batting average in history for completed careers of 10 or more innings, behind Sir Donald Bradman.

Christopher Lance Cairns, ONZM (born 13 June 1970) is a former all-rounder who played for the New Zealand international cricket team, the Black Caps, and is son of former New Zealand cricketer Lance Cairns. Sir, A report appears in this morning's Herald of the Amateur Athletic Sport, in which your reporter makes the following statement respecting the Five-mile Bicycle Race. Six machines started, and to the surprise of a great many, the race was won very easily by Mr A.C.Auster, who rode a machine about half the size of his opponents, but it being double geared, enabled him to get double the number of revolutions without as much propelling power being required.

This is quite a mistake. The Kangaroo Safety machine ridden by Auster is a 36-inch wheel, geared up to go at a speed equal to a 54-inch wheel, but it requires rather more propelling power. It was only borrowed on Saturday morning by Mr.Auster from Mr. A.Kady of Queen-street, and before that morning he had never ridden it. In fact, he was in doubt whether to ride the Kangaroo or his own roadster, and only chose the Kangaroo because it was a somewhat lighter machine.

The Kangaroo bicycle is not specially contrived to ensure speed, but is intended for safety. Perhaps the best means to illustrate the powers of this Kangaroo machine is to give the best records made on the different bicycles for one mile: - Humber races (ordinary type), 2min 31-1/2 sec; safety bicycle (any make), 2min 48 2 5th sec. Mr. Auster is well known as a good English cyclist, and I give below an extract from the "Cycling and Wheel World Annual" for 1885, which will show to any candid reader that the prize on Saturday fell to Auster, not because he had a specially good machine, but because he was a specially good man. A.C.Auster has also come out strong this season, and has fairly figured on the scratch mark.

At the Speedwell Sports he ran second to Ball in the 10-mile scratch race, and at the meeting of the South London Harriers and Manhattan Athletic Club at the same place in the following week, he beat F.Sutton and ran second to Ratcliff in the 5 miles scratch race. A week later he won the Centaur half-hour scratch race, and on the following Saturday beat both B.Ratcliff and H.A.Speechley (the one-mile champion) in the 3 miles scratch race of the Moseley Harriers, in 9min 50 4 5th secs; waiting tactics being indulged in, he won on the spurt.

He ran second to Sanders Sellers at Huddersfield for the One-mile Championship of the North.

These are his principal performances. He is possessed of a magnificent spurt, and is a steady and consistent rider. - I am, &c., Jas.A.Cooper. Hon.Sec. Waitemata Bicycle Club, 44, Victoria-street, March 7, 1887.

His Excellency the Governor and Mr Walrond visited the Park, but were unable to stay any length of time, and only saw the 120 yards Maiden run. The Burnham Band was on the ground, and played a number of selections in a very creditable manner. The number of people on the ground was the largest the Club have yet been favored with, and showed that the change in the date of the meeting was a step in the right direction. The racing, on the whole, was as good as one could wish to see, and opinions are unanimous that the meeting was one of the most successful the Club has held. The officials again worked well, and punctuality was observed in carrying out the events at the advertised time. An afternoon cup of tea was again dispensed.....The quarter-mile handicap (ladies' bracelet) proved a soft thing for J.S.Hawkes, one of the limit men....."

The following account of the race courtesy National Library of New Zealand - Papers Past - from "Otago Witness" 21st February 1889:

"The annual interprovincial bicycle races of the Dunedin Cycling Club were held on the Carisbrook ground on Saturday afternoon. There was a very fair attendance of the public. The arrangements in connection with the sports were carried out in a model manner, and the officers of the club must be congratulated upon their success.

The only fault was that the programme was much too long, and many people had to leave before one of the most important races was finished. The racing was, on the whole, very interesting; while the local men were successful in winning a large share of the prizes, it was particularly gratifying that the visitors from Christchurch and Oamaru did not go away empty-handed. Indeed, the two Christchurch men, Langdown and Wilson, succeeded in carrying off the principal prizes, while Weir of Oamaru, who rode in very good style, also won a good race. Major Goring, Messrs W.Crow, and J.Edmond, junr., acted as judges, Mr S.M.Park as starter, and Mr F.Hyams and Mr F.Ricketts as timekeepers.

N.Z. Cyclists' Alliance Championship Five-mile Bicycle Race.- First prize, gold medal; second prize, silver medal; third prize, bronze medal. W H Langdown (Pioneer Bicycle Club (Christchurch) 1; C R Wilson (Pioneer Bicycle Club, Christchurch) 2; S B Steadman (Dunedin Cycling Club) 3; James Howlison (Dunedin Cycling Club) 0; James Weir, (Oamaru Cycling Club) 0.

This race was the championship event allotted by the New Zealand Cyclists' Alliance (the governing body of cycling in New Zealand) to the Dunedin Cycling Club, and was competed for by members of the clubs affiliated to the alliance, the prizes being the alliance medals. A good deal of interest was attached to it from the fact that two of the crack riders from Christchurch - viz., Langdown and Wilson - were to compete with the local men. H.A.Soanes, a Christchurch man, who has rapidly come to the fore front of racing bicyclists, and who recently distinguished himself by winning the 10-mile championship of New Zealand, had also entered, but unfortunately had not been able to get away for the meeting. This left the issue practically between Langdown, Wilson, and Steadman, for it was recognised that neither Howlison nor Weir had any chance.

Of the other three Wilson, owing to the fine form which he displayed in the previous races, was the most fancied, but several of the old hands predicted a win for Langdown, who had apparently been reserving himself for this event. Steadman, though he had established an enviable reputation both here and in the old country, was looked upon as altogether out of form, for, owing to a severe spill, which had rendered him insensible for some little time, he had not been on his machine for nearly 10 days. Weir started to make the pace for the first round or two, but retired, soon to be followed by Howlison. The other three riders kept close together, and rattled off mile after mile at a fair rate. Wilson and Steadman took turns at making the pace, and Langdown kept all the while discreetly in the rear. Steadman's pretty style of riding was much admired, as he held himself well and used his ankles finely. Langdown also rode in good style, also using his ankles to great advantage. Indeed every muscle of his legs could be seen doing its share of work, and his only fault was that he bent his body overmuch. Wilson, on the other hand, rode a little stiffly, so far as ankle play was concerned, and it was recognised that this would militate against his success when it came to spurting.

Round after round was rattled off without anything of importance occurring, and it was not till the last half-mile of the journey was entered upon that the real racing commenced. Wilson then shot past Steadman, who was leading, Steadman made an effort to get to the front again but failed, and Langdown then began to come up. The three kept close together, and at the back of the course in the last lap Wilson still led, with Steadman second. Langdown's time had now come, and straining every muscle he came amid loud cheers with a splendid spurt, and getting to the front at the final bend he rushed up the straight at a rattling pace and won a grand race by a couple of lengths, Steadman easing up a dozen lengths behind. Time, 18min 28 4/5sec."

From the 'Mataura Ensign', 10th March 1900:-

"The road race to Croydon Siding and back promoted by the Gore Cycling Club was held last evening, when twelve of the eighteen riders entered for the event started. Most of them, however, found the pace too warm, and halted by the wayside, and two of their number turning back and racing home put the time-keeper out in his calculations, so that the time given for the race (30min 40sec), can only be regarded as approximate. The winner turned up in D.Taylor (20sec), J.Stewart, from the same mark, second, McKenzie (2min 40sec) third, and A.Wallis (20sec) fourth. Stewart had hard luck in puncturing his tyre when about half way, and borrowed a machine which also went wrong when near home, or the result might have been altered. A large number of spectators witnessed the start and finish, and might have shown more consideration for the riders by giving them room to race home. On some occasion of the kind an accident will inevitably occur unless an improvement in this respect is made."

"TWO RECORDS BROKEN - A FINE PERFORMANCE.

The Enfield cyclist, F.Shalders, made another attempt to establish fresh New Zealand records for one mile and two-mile motor-paced, with flying start. He succeeded in both attempts, and in the two mile ride put up a sterling performance. Paced by F.Baker, Shalders first attacked Donald's two mile time of 3 min 14sec. Getting to work smartly, the first mile was covered in just over 1.33, and the second in about 1.30, the time for the full journey being 3 min 3 1-5sec. Each of the miles was ridden in better time than the existing record, but as they were not timed separately by the official watches no claim could be made for records for them. After a rest Shalders started for the mile, a very hot pace being set by the motor in an attempt to cut a lot off the existing figures. The rider held the pace for three laps, but in the fourth was shaken off and slowed up, but still covered the distance in 1 min 34sec-a new record. Shalders was heartily cheered by the large number of spectators present. It is probable that other riders will attempt to better Shalder's times, and Mr J.Murphy (Grosvenor Hotel), intends to offer a handsome gold medal to be awarded to the first man who can reduce the time for two miles to 3 minutes."

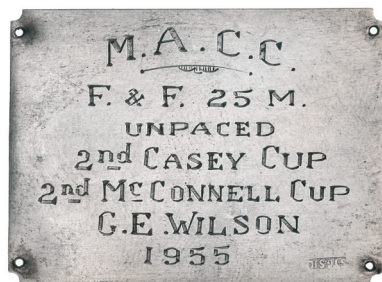

OBITUARY - WILLIAM LIGHTFOOT.

"About four o'clock on Saturday afternoon the bell at the Fire Brigade station pealed forth an alarm. Less than an hour later the same bell was solemnly tolling the death knell of the Fire Brigade's Captain, who, in his haste to obey its summons, over exerted himself, and, five minutes after he left his home apparently in robust health, fell dead just as he approached the scene of the fire which he was on his way to subdue. Swiftly the news spread that with awful suddenness William Lightfoot had been, summoned to his last rest, and over the faces of the holiday keepers who were soon wending their way homewards from the festivities in Trafalgar Park, there crept a look of awe as they slowly realised the terrible event by which one of Nelson's best known citizens had been snatched from their midst, and a bright and happy household plunged into a depth of sorrow which it would be profanity for a stranger to attempt to fathom. The details of the tragic occurrence are brief and soon told. In the morning he had been working hard in aiding to beat out a fire which had been started by someone in Toi Toi Valley, and was threatening to do great damage unless extinguished. From there he went home and was resting, when the sound of the fire bell again called him out, the alarm being raised on account of a fire that had been kindled by a lighted match being thrown into the dry grass on the hill at the back of the Botanical Reserve. Slipping on his uniform, he started off at a run, which he appears to have kept up until reaching the junction of Tasman and Manuka Streets, where he hailed a cab, in which he drove to Milton Street at the foot of the hill on which Mr Sharp's house stands. Here the driver chanced to look round and saw Mr Lightfoot apparently in a dead faint. Assistance was summoned, and Mrs Fleming and a constable got into the cab and held him up while others brought water, but it was soon seen that something more serious had occurred than was at first thought, he was driven first to Dr. Hudson's, then to Dr. Laggatt's, then to Dr. Cressey's, but all were found to be away from home. Shortly afterwards Dr. Cressey was met, who at once saw that he was beyond the reach of human aid, and riding on to the house of a friend of Mrs Lightfoot's he told her his sad story, which she broke to the unhappy widow before the cab with its melancholy burden arrived at the house.

It would be difficult to name any man who would be more missed in Nelson than will Mr Lightfoot be, and certainly there was no more familiar face to be seen in the streets. For over fourteen years he has occupied the position of City Surveyor, to which he was appointed on the 3rd September 1875, being selected from ten competitors by the City Council. The gasworks which were created by the Provincial Government, were then under the control of the City Council though they had not actually acquired them by purchase, and the duties undertaken by the deceased comprised the management of all public works in the town, "consisting of gas and waterworks, and the streets and sewers, and the duties include a general supervision over all works and property of the Corporation." Such was the description given in the advertisement calling for applications for the office. In his new capacity Mr Lightfoot displayed a considerable amount of natural ability, for he had had no previous training, having been brought up to the trade of a builder, though for a short time he had occupied the position of Superintendent of Public Works under the Provincial Government. Self taught entirely, it was highly creditable to his perseverance and ability that he should have mastered the details of the various departments over which he was exercising supervision at the time of his death. Repeated proof was afforded of his knowledge of the value of work by the unfailing accuracy of his estimates for contracts for which the Council had invited tenders. Difficult indeed is the task which the Council have to face in providing his successor.

But the deceased was most better known as Captain of the Fire Brigade than as City Surveyor. He had been connected with the Brigade for over 22 years; in 1868 he was appointed Treasurer in the place of his brother in Law Mr R. Morton, and in 1873 and every subsequent year he was unanimously elected Captain. In the work of the Brigade he was an enthusiast; in the management of it he proved himself an excellent tactician. In such bodies disagreements and unpleasantnesses must occasionally arise, but in the Nelson Brigade they were never allowed to grow and increase. A kindly word, a judicious remonstrance from their head, whom they all honoured and respected, was quite sufficient, to heal little sores which, if neglected, might have become serious wounds, and to restore amity and good fellowship among the members. He was always ready to lead them in any charitable work, and as for the excellence of the training those under him received at his hands, not a fire that has occurred in Nelson for many years past but has borne witness to it.

The immediate cause of his death was stoppage of the heart's action brought on by over exertion, and we learn from members of the Brigade that they had more than once observed that hurrying to the scene of a fire appeared to be too much for him. Notably was the case on the occasion of the recent fire at the Hall of Commerce, when he was remonstrated with for having run all the way from his house, and begged not to do so again when a fire broke out in a locality where an officer of the Brigade might safely be calculated upon being in attendance in a few minutes after the alarm was raised. However, as we said before, he was an enthusiast, and a strong desire to carry out the work in which he took so deep an interest overmastered every other consideration. When death overtook him it found him in harness, and engaged in the execution of his duty. It may here be mentioned that Mr Lightfoot was one of the earliest Volunteers in the colony, he being one of the first four to be sworn in in Nelson.

Mr Lightfoot married the elder of the two daughters of Mr Joseph Webb, a well known and highly respected old resident of Nelson, and he leaves a family of five, two boys and three girls, the youngest being about four years of age. It is almost superfluous to say that with his widow and fatherless children there is a feeling of deep sympathy, shared in not only by their many personal friends, but by the whole community. It is a strange coincidence that the husband of Mrs Lightfoot's sister, whom Mr Lightfoot succeeded as Treasurer to the Brigade, died as suddenly some years ago as he whose loss so many are mourning to-day, and that, rightly or wrongly, his death was at the time attributed to the effects of his exertions at a fire on the previous day. We understand that Mr Lightfoot's funeral is arranged to take place on Wednesday next, by which time his eldest son will have arrived from Christchurch."

"DESTRUCTIVE FIRE - Damage About £2000

EHRENFRIED BROS.' BREWERY DESTROYED.

About 1.45 o'clock this morning the firebells pealed out an alarm, and in an incredibly short time a large number of persons were hurrying to the scene of the conflagration, which proved to be Ehrenfried Bros.' large brewery establishment in Mackay Street.

The members of the Shortland branch of the Fire Brigade, under Supt. West and Capt. McLachlan, were the first to appear upon the spot, but by this time the fire had a very firm hold of the building, and the flames, which had burst through the roof, were burning fiercely, the heat being intense. The hose was immediately connected with the four-inch main at the corner of Mackay Street, near Mr Buckland's hotel, and a jet of water was soon playing upon the burning building.

This, however, it could be plainly seen, was altogether inadequate to suppress the conflagration, and prevent the further spread of the flames, so that as soon as the Grahamstown contingent arrived about 600ft of hose were laid down, and a good supply of the aqueous element obtained from the fireplug connected with the nine-inch main at Pollen Street corner.

Both jets were then directed upon the mass of flame from the rear of the premises, but without much apparent result, as the fire had too strong a hold to be easily quenched. By this time nearly the whole of the upper storey had been consumed, and a loud crash announced the fact that the foundation upon which the three large boilers rested, had given way, and that they had been precipitated through the middle floor into the lower room, bringing with them a mass of debris.

The firemen worked hard, and under great difficulties, as overhead were nine large iron tanks, erected on trestles, being filled with water at boiling point, which threatened to fall at any moment. At one time one of the ladders upon which a fireman was standing was ignited while resting upon the side of the building, and had to be removed.

There were about 1500ft of hose out, and consequently the pressure of water after travelling this distance was not as good as could be desired, but the firemen prevented the whole of the office being consumed, and only a portion of the roof was destroyed.

The large brick building at the rear of the wooden structure, and which contains the most valuable portions of the machinery and stock, was not damaged; while the store in which the spirits are kept is situated some 20 or 30ft from the brick building, and was not even scorched.

Fortunately there was scarcely a breath of wind blowing, or there can be no doubt the conflagration would have been much more serious, as despite the most strenuous exertions of the firemen, it would in all probability have spread to the adjoining buildings.

Mr Ehrenfried was on a visit to the Thames during last week, but left here on Saturday for Auckland, where Messrs Styak and Myers also are at present, having gone thither on business on Friday last.

STATEMENTS:

Mr F.Mason, who was in charge of the brewery during the absence of Messrs Styak and Myers, states as follows:

'I was awakened by someone calling out "Fire" and at once noticed the reflection on the window, as I live opposite the brewery. My wife looked out of the window, and informed me that the brewery was on fire, when I hurriedly dressed myself and proceeded thither. The flames had then a good hold of the building, and were bursting through the roof. I removed the horses to the paddock, at the same time giving the alarm by calling out "Fire" as loudly as possible.

I met Messrs Lomas and Scudder, and Constable Bern, who assisted me to connect the hose on the premises with the fire-plug, and began playing on the burning roof. Messrs Townsend and Fleming then arrived. The office was broken into, and the valuables, papers, documents, &c, removed to a place of safety.

By this time the Fire Brigade had arrived, and did everything in their power to save the premises. Being in charge of the brewery in the absence of the manager, it was my duty before leaving the premises to go through the place and see that everything was safe, which I did, and when I left about 9 o'clock, there was no appearance whatever of fire.

We had been brewing yesterday, and had a fire in the top building, on what is termed the second floor; while the steam engine fire was also alight. Both these, however, were put out by the brewer (Mr T.Clark) about 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon. From the appearance of the fumes when I first observed them, I should think the fire originated in the vicinity of the furnace on the second floor, or about the centre of the building.'

Mr T.Clark, another of the employees, states that he left the brewery between 5 and 6 o'clock last evening, when everything was apparently safe. He was first apprised of the occurrence by Constable O'Brien, who came to his house.

Messrs Griffiths and Clinker, the only other persons employed by Mr Ehrenfried, were not aware of the fire until a late hour this morning.

In the course of a conversation with Mr McLachlan, Captain of the Shortland branch of the Fire Brigade, that gentleman made a statement to the following effect:

'I was first aroused about 1.30 by Mrs Phillips, who lives on the opposite side of the street in which I reside. I believe she was first informed of the fire by Mr Winstanley, who was proceeding homewards in the direction of Parawai, when upon reaching the Grey Street bridge he observed the glare, and immediately gave an alarm, although being a new arrival he was not aware of the exact whereabouts of the firebells.

I at once ran to the brewery in company with my son, and the bells had not then commenced ringing. There were at this time very few persons about, but the flames were bursting through the roof, which was burning fiercely. The fire appeared to be confined solely to the upper storey, and the lower floor was untouched by the fiery element, although the debris was falling on it from the roof.'

THE DAMAGE:

Owing to the absence of Messrs Styak and Myers in Auckland, it is altogether impossible to obtain any reliable estimate of the damage sustained through the conflagration. It is stated that beer valued at £500 has been destroyed, while the portion of the refrigerating machinery in the wooden building, used for the purpose of cooling the beer, was also completely ruined.

In the upper storey there were also situated a malt press, hop press, three vats (two wooden and one stone), and three large boilers, one of which was copper, and had not yet been erected, having been purchased only a short time ago. Nine iron tanks, together with the pipes connected there with, were also rendered useless, and fell this afternoon from the trestle work at the rear of the wooden building.

On the lower floor a quantity of malt, hops, sugar, &c, was stored, together with numerous barrels of beer, and nearly the whole of the latter has been rendered unfit for sale. We are informed by a competent judge that the damage will amount to £2000, but as before mentioned, no reliable information on this point can be obtained until the return of Messrs Styak and Myers.

THE POLICE:

Sergt. Murphy, and Constables O'Brien, Bern, Dunn, Fleming, and Bullen were present, and rendered every assistance in their power. The large concourse of spectators present were very orderly, although as usual some persons seemed to amuse themselves by treading upon the hose, thus hindering the firemen in their work.

THE ORIGIN:

The origin of the fire remains enshrouded in mystery, as it appears that there had been no fire on the premises since 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon. There seems to be a general consensus of opinion, however, that the fire originated about the centre of the upper storey of the building, and this is borne out by an examination of the place to-day.

The lower room has almost escaped untouched by the fiery element, although it is strewn with debris from the upper storey.

THE INSURANCES:

It was rumored to-day that there were insurances on the stock and buildings aggregating to £3000, but upon enquiry we learn that none of the Thames agents for the various companies have taken any risks thereon, so that the insurances have been effected in Auckland. No authentic information is to be obtained here on the subject, but we understand that the London and Lancashire Insurance Company took a risk on the stock and premises, the greater portion of which was subsequently re-insured with other companies.

INQUIRY:

We understand that there is some likelihood of an inquiry being held into the circumstances connected with the fire, although nothing has yet been decided."

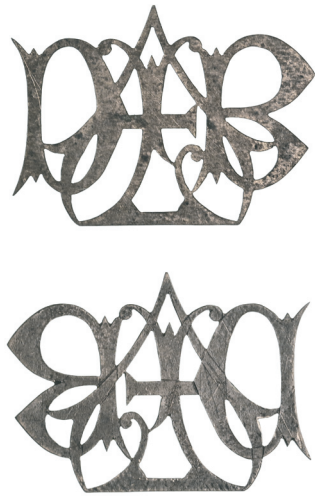

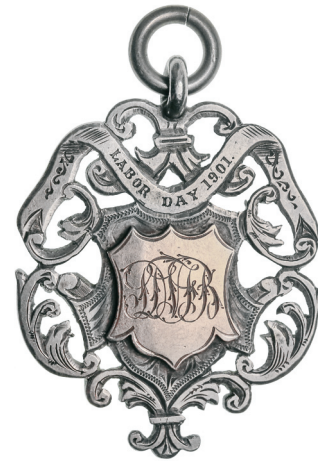

"A fire took place at Mr.T.T.Masefield's foundry, Albert-street, shortly before six o'clock on Saturday morning. The fire was first noticed by Mr. George Jessup, one of Mr. Masefield's tenants, residing at the western side of the foundry. Jessup had just got up, and was going to his work, when he noticed smoke issuing from the vicinity of the fitting and machine shop. He at once gave the alarm, which brought Mr. James Moir, the caretaker, on the scene. Mr. Jessup went to the Albert-street Fire Brigade station. The fire originated in the division of the foundry which extends from Albert-street to Chapel Square, and in about the centre of the building, on the ground floor, in the vicinity of the stokehole of the engine. Fortunately the fire brigade, under Superintendent Gladding, and the Salvage Corps, under Captain Field, were promptly on the ground, and prevented the spread of the fire to the whole establishment. The fires were banked as usual on the previous night, and were left apparently all safe. The stokehole is of stone, but adjoining is a small box, or shed, for storing tools, and it is supposed that a spark may have been blown from the stokehole to this shed and thus ignited it. The shed stood near the wall of the machine and patternshop. The machine-shop is a building about 130 ft in length by 36ft in width, with brick wall and iron roof. Apparently the fire had travelled through a window from the tool-shed and got into the upper storey, where there were a large accumulation of patterns, amongst which the flames did a good deal of damage at the western end of the building. It is supposed that the fire had been creeping along here before being discovered. The fire brigade succeeded in preventing the fire getting into the eastern end of the annexe, where the great bulk of the patterns were stored. It is difficult at present, to compute with any accuracy the damage, but Mr. Masefield estimates the loss on patterns at from £400 to £500 above insurance. The damage to machinery would appear to be fully covered. The New Zealand Insurance Company has a policy of £4000, but estimate their loss will be about £500, as a great proportion was reinsured. The fire brigade deserve great credit for the way they handled the fire. Mr. Masefield's three tenants, at the western end of the foundry, were not insured, and have had their effects partly damaged by smoke and water. Owing to the heat some of the windows of the houses are cracked. The inmates in the top storey had some difficulty in getting out, owing to the smoke."

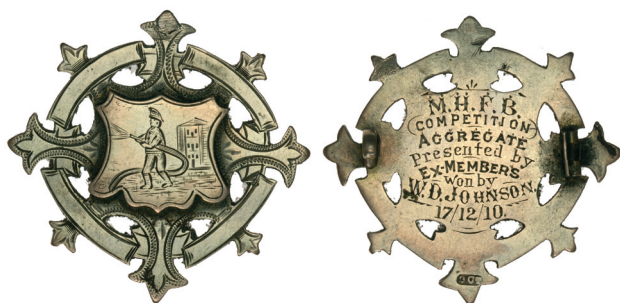
