"CALEDONIAN SPORTS.

The public of Nelson were indebted to the Caledonian Society for a most pleasant holiday yesterday. At an early hour the cabs began to run in the direction of the Maitai well laden with passengers, in addition to whom there was a constant stream of pedestrians all wending their way towards the same goal, and by two o'clock there must have been quite 1500 people on the ground, where the arrangements that, had been made were excellent, and reflected great credit upon the Committee and their indefatigable secretary, Mr.Brind.

A ring, 180 yards in circumference, had been roped off for greater convenience in carrying out the various sports, for viewing which, every facility was afforded by the erection of a stand, which was largely patronised throughout the day, while the commissariat department was well attended to by the proprietors of the numerous booths. The weather, too, proved delightful, the clouds being just sufficient to form a protection against the sun's rays, while a delicious breeze that, was blowing rendered the atmosphere cooler than it had been for several days past.

Shortly after eleven the programme commenced with a hundred yards race for boys, and was carried out with considerable spirit throughout the whole day, special interest attaching to the racing and wrestling, in the latter of which Mr.Stavert, who proved himself the champion last year, again came off with flying colors, even though he had to contend against the most disadvantageous circumstances, there being altogether five competitors, and he, having thrown, first the man against whom he was originally matched, and secondly, the winner of the other bout, being compelled to tackle the odd man, who came into the ring perfectly fresh, for the best of three throws. It also happened that this last man proved by far the most formidable of the three against whom he had to compete, and a prettier tussle than that which took place between these two could scarcely be imagined.

It was evidently Mr.Christopher's game to wind his opponent, who was not by any means in first rate condition, not having undergone any previous training, and consequently it was a long time before the necessary grip was obtained, but when the struggle arrived at that stage, the result was not long in doubt, Mr.Christopher quickly going down with his massive rival on top of him. At the second turn an equally long contest took place with a different result, however, Mr.Stavert being this time underneath in the fall. In a very few minutes the rivals were hard at it again for the third time, but this was but a very short bout, Mr.Stavert succeeding almost at the first attempt in getting a grip of his man who was at once thrown heavily, the victor on this occasion not accompanying him in his fall.

In the running flat leap the fine distance of 20ft 8 1/2in was accomplished by Mr. E.Blundell, who gained the first prize, the second being awarded to Mr.Norgate, who ran, or rather jumped, him very close, the umpire recording 20ft, 7in as his leap.

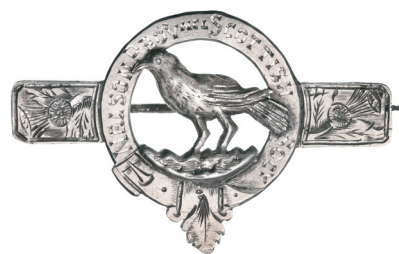
The gymnastic feats on the horizontal bar were exceedingly clever, those performed by Messrs. Brind and Gully attracting considerable attention, and giving rise to no little applause. The mile race, for which nine started, was cleverly won by Mr.Tennant, who ran with great judgment, and appeared to be in excellent condition, the result, we are told, of hard training, which fully entitled him to the prize he so fairly won. One of his opponents, Mr.Sayle, ran in far better form but, either from want of speed or of wind, he was unable to successfully compete with the winner.

The tilting in the ring was a very pretty trial of skill, and was viewed with much interest by the lookers-on, Mr.Lines, who occupied a similar honorable position last year, proving the winner. We have alluded to these few events as being specially worthy of notice, but cannot afford space to describe in detail the whole of the day's proceedings, the results of which will be found below.

The three prize medals for vaulting with the pole, tilting in the ring, and the mile race, were, before the close of the day, presented to the successful competitors by Lady Monro, who addressed a few suitable words to each of the winners, as she pinned the prize to his breast.

The Nelson band, which was in attendance, tended to enliven the proceedings, and its strains proved irresistible to lovers of the dance, who formed themselves into parties in various parts of the field.

On the whole the sports were a decided success, and the Society under whose auspices they were got up are to be congratulated on their able management...."

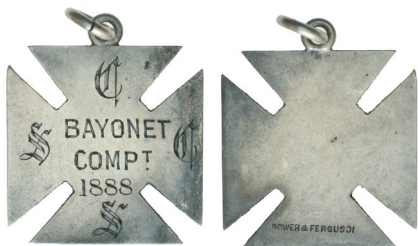

"Caledonian Sports.

The Scotch make capital colonists, but go where they will they ever carry with them the remembrance of their native land. In nearly every Scotch parish they have their sports meeting, and strange to say, some of the most important gatherings are those held at mere villages. The prize-money in towns and cities may be large, but the highest honors are not won there. Hawke's Bay has a large percentage of Scotch people, but yet it is only a few months since the Caledonian Society was inaugurated. Its progress, considering the short time that has since elapsed, has been very great, and it is safe to say that it has before it a long and prosperous career. To-day its inaugural meeting took place on the Recreation Ground, and when the meeting was announced there was much rejoicing in many out-of-the-way districts, for to the Scotchman the skirl of the pipes is the sweetest music in the world.

The programme prepared was on a most liberal scale, there being quite a number of open and amateur events, for which the prize-money totalled more than £200. The day being declared a general holiday placed facilities in the way of many thoroughly enjoying themselves. The railway authorities issued special excursion tickets, which were largely availed of, so that Napier last night was full of the sons and daughters of the "Land of Cakes". The value of the prizes was sufficient to attract athletes from every part of the colony, so that all that was necessary to ensure a highly successful meeting was fine weather. This morning early the wind was very high, and then a heavy shower or two followed, with the result that long before the business of the day began the atmosphere was light and cool, giving every promise of a lovely day. The arrangements carried out by the secretary, Mr W. Bogle were of a most satisfactory character, and everything was done for the convenience and comfort of the great crowd of visitors who it was highly anticipated would grace the ground with their presence.

On the ground things were extremely lively, musical selections being given at intervals by a band of pipers in full Highland costume, and while the pipers were resting, the Railway Band gave selections at intervals. Quite a number of side shows were provided. For the benefit of the little ones at each end there was a merry-go-round, both of which were freely patronised. Lessons in the scientific art of boxing were to be had for a consideration, while Aunt Sally and other games could be indulged in by their admirers. The inner man was not overlooked, for three refreshment rooms testified as to the provision made in this direction. The sports ground was railed off, so that the public could not interfere with the competitors; this also enabled the spectators, no matter where their vantage ground, to have a good view of the various contests. The stands were freely patronised, and from each a capital view could be obtained. The charge of admission to the hills resulted in very few spectators being visible there. The convincing ground was in capital condition, so that the times made, remembering there is no cinder track, were at least creditable to the competitors, and showed that much careful training had been indulged in. The first event was started pretty punctually, and this was very necessary, in view of the large number to be got through during the course of the day. The judges and officials worked hard, and seemed to give every satisfaction both to competitors and public by their decisions. In the short distance races each competitor ran between chalk lines, which was nearly as good as having a roped course, for each man had to keep within his lines. A detachment of police under Sergeant Cullen were present to keep order, but their services were little required as there was no disposition shown to get over the defined limits.

The attendance at the opening of the sports could not have much exceeded one thousand, but there was a constant stream of visitors entering the ground till nearly lunch time. About two o'clock there was a great increase in the attendance, and at this hour there must have been fully three thousand people on the ground. The country people mustered strongly, and it was evident that the Scotchmen from all parts of Hawke's Bay had assembled to celebrate the day. The great event of the meeting - at least the one in which most interest seemed to be generally taken - was the Boy's Race, for which thirty competitors of all ages and sizes competed. It was run in one heat, which precluded all chance of a scratch man getting through."

"The first annual gathering of the Southland Highland Society at Invercargill last night was very successful, attracting as it did Highlanders from all parts of the province. The Chief, Mr D.A.Cameron (Nokomai), presided, and gave a short address on the society itself, setting forth its objects and claiming for it the sympathy and support of the Celts of Southland. An original poem in honor of the occasion was recited by the author; Mr A.Kinross, whose effort was acknowledged by the audience. Gaelic speeches were given by Messrs John McDonald (Palmeraton) and Hugh Cameron (Mataura), and a Gaelic song by Mr John McNeill (Forest Hill), and Chieftain McKellar and Miss Kelso gave a dialogue in Gaelic, and Mr K.Cameron a recitation in the same tongue. Mr Duncan Cameron (Mataura) played an original composition of bagpipe music - his own work which was highly appreciated by all. An enjoyable dance sustained till an early hour this morning, concluded the proceedings."

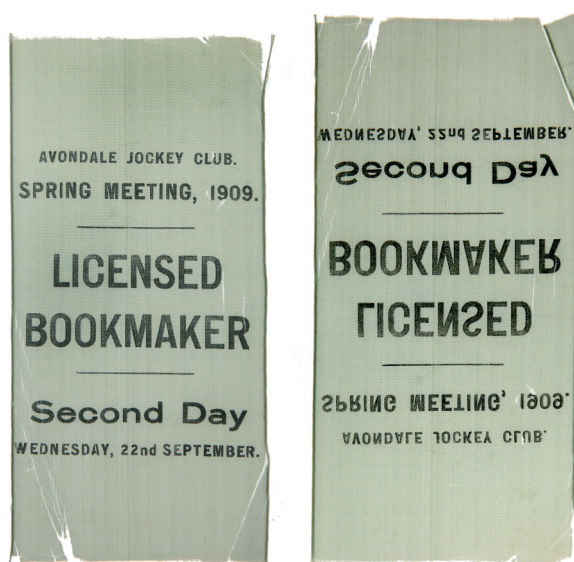
Henry Thomson Gorrie was born in Auckland on 12 December 1849. He spent his early working life with the Bank of New Zealand. Henry (known as Harry) spent time on the goldfields of the west coast of the South Island buying gold for the bank in places such as Lyell and Ross. In the 1880s Henry Thomson Gorrie returned to Auckland and went into the stock and auctioneering business with his father-in-law, Alfred Buckland. In the early 1900s H.T.Gorrie became Managing Director of the business which was known as Alfred Buckland & Sons.

Gorrie was elected a life member of the Auckland Racing Club in 1909. He died in 1922 aged 73.

"Man o' War launched the Australian onslaught on New Zealand's feature races through the 1920s, when in the skilled hands of James Bryce he won the 1920 and 1921 Auckland Cups for J.R. (James) Corrigan.

Man o' War proved a great performer in New Zealand over several seasons.

In his first Auckland Cup win he came from 84 yards to score decisively in 4:29 2/5.

The following season, after easily winning the National Cup at Addington in August, he failed in New Zealand Cup.

He started second favourite, but found the task of conceding six seconds to his 11 rivals too much after being 'off' in his work leading up to the meeting, and was not raced again at the carnival.

James Randle Corrigan moved from Canterbury to settle at Hawera in 1893. Aged 28, he was already imbued with a love for trotting.

He regularly acquired horses from Canterbury, Auckland, Hawke's Bay and even Australia for breeding and racing from his Taranaki base.

Corrigan's good mare Joan of Arc won the first Hawera Cup at Hawera Trotting Club's one-day meeting Easter 1914, and on that day his son A.J. (Alex) Corrigan had his first ride in a trotting race when he competed in the Farmers' Plate.

Joan of Arc was later sent to Christchurch to be trained by James Bryce and gave James Bryce jun. one of his earliest wins.

While Alex served in the First World War his father built up his trotting interests, and was amongst the first to transport horses by road.

In 1918 his mare Queen Chimes, trained by James Bryce, won the Champion Stakes for three-year-olds at Addington on Easter Saturday, was shipped to Wellington on the inter-island ferry that night and was slung out of the hold on to a Thornycroft lorry waiting at the wharf on the Sunday morning.

Because of a breakdown, the lorry did not arrive in Hawera until the Monday morning.

Against the bookmakers' predictions that afternoon she won the Waimate Plains Taranaki Stakes, the first classic race held at a country meeting in the North Island.

She became the dam of Worthy Queen.

Continuing to expand his trotting interests, J.R.Corrigan was the nation's leading owner in 1921/22 and 1922/23.

As well as Bryce, Andy Pringle trained for him, and Eugene McDermott was often called on to drive his horses.

With the Australian-bred Whisht he won the first Rowe Cup Handicap in 1918 and the eighth edition of the Dominion Handicap in 1919.

The Australian-bred pacer Man o' War won him the Auckland Cup in 1920 from 84 yards behind, driven by James Bryce, and in 1921 from 96 yards, driven by Andrew Bryce.

Another of his horses First Carbine, driven by James Bryce jun., was runner-up to Man o' War in the second of those wins.

Great Hope was acquired by 'J.R.' after winning the 1921 Great Northern Derby for Robert McMillan and won the 1922 New Brighton Derby.

Corrigan sold him and he went on to win the 1923 New Zealand Cup and many other fine accomplishments.

Not long after his good performer Alto Chimes had won the 1923 National Cup Handicap from the Bryce stable, James Corrigan brought his horses from the South Island to train them at his Hawera stable, where Alex supervised them.

From the time he was a lad Alex had completed successfully with ponies and horses in ring events at the various Taranaki A & P shows, and he rode as whip with the Egmont-Wanganui Hunt Club.

He began driving as an amateur in the early 1920s, and his first win came with his father's Ivy Audubon, a smart pacer whose wins included a Wanganui Cup and Manawatu Trotting Club Cup.

His second win came with Rose Bingen who after being subsequently sold by his father won the 1925 Rowe Cup for C.Johnstone.

In the late 1920s Alex drove his father's Nelson Bingen trotting mare Sister Beatrice to numerous wins including the Wiretap Trotting Cup and the Hawke's Bay Cup.

She beat good pacers on several occasions.

In 1921 Man o' War came from 96 yards behind to complete his Auckland Cup double, taking the race by a head from his stablemate First Carbine, raced also by J.R.Corrigan and driven by J.Bryce jun.

With a win also in the Canterbury Park King George Handicap in June, Man o' War headed the stake-earners' list that term with £2935.

Racing in New Zealand from age six to 12, Man o' War proved a great performer. Later in life he was prepared by J.S.(Jack) Shaw, who considered him the greatest stayer he handled.

In his interview with Karl Scott for Pillars of Harness Horsesdom, Shaw speaking of Man o' War, said:

He was so clean-winded that he would race on less work than any other horse I ever trained. In addition, he had a splendid disposition and was most intelligent. I only had him for about 12 months.

The last time I drove Man o' War was a very memorable occasion. It was at Addington, when a special day's racing was put on in honour of the American fleet. Man o' War rose to the occasion and won the HMS Hood Handicap, the leading event of the day.

This was the worst day that I have ever experienced on a racetrack. There was hail and sleet all day, and the races could not be postponed, as this was the only day the fleet could be in Christchurch. Of this particular race I saw only about half. Man o' War came from the back mark and did the job himself. I was absolutely blinded with the slush that was flying everywhere.

This may sound incredible, but there are many of the old drivers who will vividly remember it. Some of our mounts had to be led back to the birdcage, as we were driving blind. The morning after the races I woke up in daylight but everything was still black. It was hours before my eyesight returned to normal.

As was the lot of many home-bred and, particularly, Australian-bred sires in New Zealand, Man o' War did not get much patronage at the stud, yet he sired outstanding pacing sons, unfortunately all of them being gelded.

Through his daughters however, Man o' War made a splendid name for himself in New Zealand's breeding history.

So much so that, despite the early apathy towards this great pacer of unfashionable ancestry, New Zealand breeders came to regard the daughters of Man o' War with great favour.

Of the 65 daughters of Man o' War bred from in New Zealand, 45 produced winners.

These included some of New Zealand's top pacers and Man o' War was close to the top of the New Zealand broodmares sires' list several times, despite the great broodmare sires Jack Potts (248), Rey de Oro (210) and Wrack (155) enjoying so many more mares at the stud.

Among the best of Man o' War's sons were War Buoy and Happy Man.

War Buoy set age records winning the 1933 Sapling Stakes and New Zealand Derby, and won 10 races on end.

That record sequence stood until equalled by Cardigan Bay (1961) and Young Quinn (1975) and bettered by Noodlum (who ended 15 straight wins in 1974).

War Buoy carried on this good form finishing second to the invincible Indianapolis in the 1935 New Zealand Cup.

Happy Man won many New Zealand races including the 1945 New Zealand Premier Sprint Championship (the name used for the New Zealand Free-for-all from 1942 to 1948).

Sold to Western Australia when considered to be over the hill, Happy Man kept beating the best there until well advanced in years.

Man o' War most famous producing daughter Navy Blue was a grand race-mare and won the 1938 Auckland Trotting Cup.

Lady Milne was another fine race-mare sired by Man o' War and she produced the Cup-class mare Trixie Milne, also a noted stud matron, who took a 4:12 1/5 two-mile mark and became the grand-dam of one of the greatest race-mares New Zealand has seen - the 1981 New Zealand Cup winner Armalight.

Loyal Nurse, winner of the 1946 Auckland cup and 1949 New Zealand Cup, was from a Man o' War mare, and her family had bred on.

Other good produce from Man o' Wars daughters included Soangetaha (winner of the 1951 and 1952 Auckland Cups), Acropolis (who beat Highland Fling in the 1948 Dunedin Centennial Cup), 1950 Auckland Cup winner Victory Globe, New Zealand Free-for-all winner Parawa Derby and Otahuhu Cup winner Heliopolis."

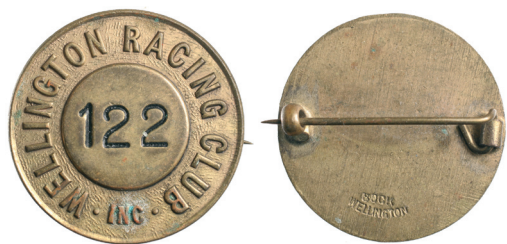

Samuel Ryder (24 March 1858 - 2 January 1936) was an English businessman, entrepreneur, golf enthusiast, and golf promoter. He originated the idea of selling garden seeds in "penny packets" and built a very successful business on the concept.

At the age of 50 he became an enthusiastic golfer and then from 1923 to 1925 he, together with his brother James, started sponsoring a number of golf tournaments and matches mostly at his home club of Verulam near St. Albans. From late 1925 he started employing Abe Mitchell as his private coach. In early 1926 the idea for a match between British and American professional golfers was proposed. Ryder became involved and sponsored the event. It had been his intention that the match would be the first Ryder Cup but it was later decided that the match would not be an official contest. The first official event did not take place until 1927 for which Ryder donated



a gold trophy.

In the 1890s, Samuel Ryder started to sell packets of seeds through the post, priced at one penny each. Other seed merchants also made postal sales, but their packets were much more expensive. He started selling from his home in St Albans, which had good mainline railway connections. He kept his stock in the garden shed of his terraced house on Folly Lane, and was assisted by his wife and daughter. The packets would be posted each Friday so that his customers, working men, would receive them for their time off on Saturday afternoons. The business grew rapidly and Ryder became wealthy. Eventually, the business moved to a large packaging workshop on Holywell Hill, employing around 100 staff. The art deco seed hall is now a CafÇ Rouge restaurant. He established a separate herb business, Heath and Heather, with his brother James in 1922 and in 1924, the company moved to a former hat factory, which had a floor area of some 24,000 square feet (2,200 m2).

Sir Robert Heaton Rhodes KCVO KBE VD (27 February 1861 - 30 July 1956), usually known as Sir Heaton Rhodes, was a New Zealand politician and lawyer.

Rhodes was born in Purau on Banks Peninsula, the son of sheep farmer and politician Robert Heaton Rhodes. He came to England to attend Brasenose College, Oxford, from which he graduated in 1884. He was called to the bar by the Inner Temple in 1887.

He then returned to New Zealand, joined the New Zealand Mounted Rifles Brigade, and served in the Second Boer War in 1902 with the 8th New Zealand Contingent. He later went on to command the 1st Mounted Rifles in the New Zealand Territorial Force. After retirement he was Honorary Colonel of the 1st Mounted Rifles.

He represented the Ellesmere electorate in the House of Representatives from 1899 to 1925, during which time he joined the Reform Party. He retired in 1925 and was appointed to the Legislative Council, in which he served until 1941, with a short break between 1932 and 1934.

He served as Postmaster-General and Minister for Public Health, Hospitals and Tourist Resorts in the Cabinet from 1912 to 1915, when he was appointed Special Commissioner to Egypt and Galilee to report on the conditions of New Zealand troops serving there. In 1916 he moved to Europe as Commissioner of the New Zealand Red Cross.

In 1920 he returned to New Zealand and was appointed Minister of Defence. In 1922 he was also appointed as Commissioner of State Forests and held both posts until 1926. From 1926 to 1928 he was Deputy Leader of the Legislative Council and minister without portfolio. In 1927 he was Minister in attendance upon the Duke and Duchess of York on their visit to New Zealand. He was vice-president of the Victoria League for Commonwealth Friendship in Canterbury in the 1930s.

He bred pedigree cattle at Otahuna, Tai Tapu, where he also grew daffodils.

Heaton Rhodes was an advanced philatelist. He had a large collection of New Zealand Chalon head postage stamps. He was President of the Royal Philatelic Society of New Zealand and signed the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists in 1949.

For his role as the Commissioner of the New Zealand Red Cross he was appointed Knight Commander of the Order of the British Empire (KBE) in the 1920 New Year Honours. For his role of dealing with the Duke and Duchess of York he was appointed Knight Commander of the Royal Victorian Order (KCVO) in July 1927. He was awarded the King George V Silver Jubilee Medal in 1935.

The prize was called into being in memory of writer Alice Esther Glen (1881-1940) who was the first notable author of children's books in New Zealand. It has been awarded yearly (with some exceptions) since 1945 by the Library and Information Association of New Zealand Aotearoa (LIANZA) to a New Zealand author "for the most distinguished contribution to New Zealand literature for junior fiction".

The Ancient Order of Foresters is one of the great Friendly Societies, which, during the past century, has spread their beneficent work throughout the world, and encouraged prudence, mutual help, and manly self-reliance among working men. To Bro. R. Woodford, who arrived in one of the first ships, belongs the honour of instituting the Order in New Zealand, and by his exertions the Court Star of Canterbury was opened at the Golden Fleece Hotel, Christchurch, in January, 1852. The United District Court of Forestry in Canterbury was established in 1863. In 1867 a Widow and Orphans' Fund was established, having for its aims and objects the relief of widows and orphans of deceased Foresters, by securing to them a weekly payment. Juvenile courts of the A.O.F. have also been formed with good results to the Order.

The Canterbury United District Executive meets on the second Thursday in April and October, at the District Chambers, Foresters' Hall, Oxford Terrace, Christchurch, or in the locality of a court. The officers are: Permanent District Secretary, Thomas Gapes; Permanent Treasurer, H. Crooks; District Chief Ranger, W. Poninghaus; District Sub-Chief Ranger, J. V. Beattie; District Beadle, F. Lill. The Board of New Zealand Foresters' Guarantee Association meets at the same time and place.

Court Star of Canterbury, No. 2309, meets at the Foresters' Hall, Christchurch, on the first and third Mondays in each month. The officers are: Permanent Secretary, S. B. Watheh; Treasurer, H. Crooks. The juvenile court meets at the same place on the last Wednesday in each month. Secretary, George W. Sears.

It is possible the jewel may have found its way to South Carolina in the USA and been presented by the Charleston, Kilwinning Lodge there. The incomplete hallmarking for the piece may be an indication that it was for export.

Wilfred Badger (18 February 1852 - 8 October 1915) was a well-known solicitor. He was born in 1852, in Rotherham, Yorkshire, and was the third son of the late H.P.Badger. He came of a generation of solicitors, his father and two of his brothers, his grandfather and three of his brothers, as well as himself and two brothers, all being solicitors. He was educated at St.Peter's, York and was articled to his uncle, passing as a solicitor in 1872, when only twenty years of age. He was admitted a few months later.

At the time of his death he was among the four members of the profession in Canterbury longest on the roll. In 1880 he arrived in New Zealand on the ship 'Glenhora', settling in Christchurch. Immediately after his arrival he joined Mr J.B.Gresson as managing clerk, and later commenced practice on his own account. Shortly afterwards he published Badger's New Zealand Statutes, later editions being continued up to 1882. He also first published the Land Transfer Law of New Zealand, Licensing Laws of Australasia and the Local Government Guide.

He was survived by his wife, three daughters and six sons, the seventh son having died at Trentham Camp in July 1915.

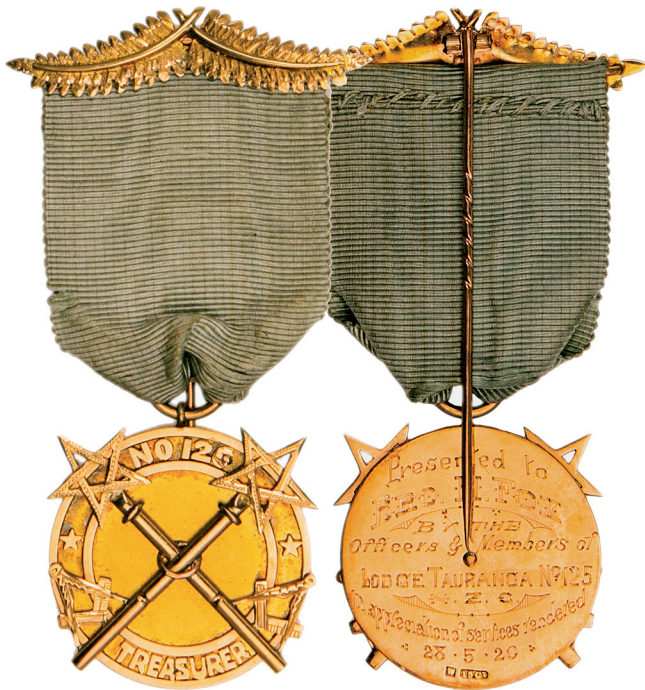
