Henry 'Harry' Cotton Beeching confirmed as Trooper in NSW Lancers.

The following letter was published in the Evening News (Sydney, NSW) on Saturday 18 August 1900, page 3 under the heading, 'Lucky Lancers'.

'Trooper H. Beeching, of the N.S.W. Lancers, writes from Pretoria on June 17, to his mother on the Richmond River, as follows: 'It has been nothing but 'spar' and hard fighting since we left Springfontein. We have been up to our neck in fight all the way, and the whole family have paddled through without a scratch. We joined the old Lancers at Bloemfontein, and thought no small slice of ourselves when we got with them. All the camp knew we were coming, and were on the lookout for us. We had a great reception.

All the Tommies were down to have a look at the 'New Sow Wale Lancers,' as they call them. They reckon they are the men they want out here; they say that Boer bullets cannot hit them, and, if they do, they glide off, and I believe them, for we have been under more heavy fire than any other regiment in French's Brigade since this march started, and are the only squadron that has gone through without losing a man. The Inniskillings, that are next to us in the ranks, have lost as many as twenty men in a day's fighting. But when our roll was called we could always fill it, or account for those who were missing. We go under the name of the 'Lucky Sow Wale Lancers,' and we are exactly that, for the corners we have been in and scratched through without some of us stopping lead is wonderful. Last Sunday week, for instance (I daresay you have heard of it now, for it was sure to go home, as General French gave the Lancers special praise for bravery and coolness) we were in the middle of a long pass, not dreaming of what was coming, when hundreds of rifles opened upon us from a lope or hill of broken granite, not 300 yards off. It was a nice trap, and no mistake. They had the whole brigade fairly at their mercy. The only thing that could be done was retire, and that left the lot under fire for at least a mile. How did both horses and men go down? There was no escape on either side, and to advance meant a clean sweep of the lot, so back they started, with our lot with them; but we were pulled up before we got far, and ordered to go back to a bit of a drain, and return the fire.

What sort of a nasty feeling did it give a chap? I could have bet my life that the lot of us would have gone down before reaching the drain for cover, and here's one who thought they had, for we were lying there for two hours, with bullets pouring in like hail. It was a case of lying low or stopping one. At any rate, we got a chance of retiring after dark, and were a sorry-looking lot going into camp. We expected to find most of our pals on the road, and in the drain riddled with bullets; but they kept straggling in by twos and

three up till 12 o'clock, and what sort of rejoicing was there when the roll was called and the word came, 'None missing.'

We were that happy that we lit a large fire, and sat up all night rehearsing our experiences. It was as happy a meeting as we had a few days after the prisoners were released, and you can guess what it was like. Just fancy, our brigade being the one to release them, and the N.S.W. Lancers were the first to get there. They saw us coming over a ridge a mile away, and could not contain themselves; but made a bolt over, through, and under the walls, and came running to meet us. The excitement was intense; but the hand-shaking and all that was soon put a stop to, for while we were in the middle of it the Boers got their 'Long Tom' out, and fired three shells in quick time at the crowd. Two of them whistled over our heads; but the other dropped fair amongst us; but luck still stuck to us, for instead of striking the ground and bursting, it fell in a soft place, and did little damage, for instead of killing one and wounding two, it must have settled at least thirty had she gone off. There was a great scatter, then our guns came galloping up, and got into action in quick order; while we were packed off to drive them out of a kopje, and got a warm reception in doing it. We lost a few horses driving them out; but the Carbiniers that came up lost both horses and men. They had the bad luck to lose an officer and two privates; but all that comes when you go out looking for fight.'

It was also reported in the Northern Star (Lismore, NSW) paper on Wednesday 6 February 1901, page 4 that on the previous Thursday an official function was held in Lismore to welcome back Trooper Beeching. He had been a member of the Lismore Fire Brigade when he resigned to volunteer to go the war in South Africa. Members of the Brigade were glad that he was rejoining the Brigade and the function proceeded in the Brigade rooms with the mayor and other dignitaries in attendance.

The death occurred at his residence, Franklin-street, Annerley, South

Brisbane, on October 29, of Mr. Joseph Woodhouse, ex-Acting-Sergeant of the Queensland Police Force. The late Sergeant Woodhouse was born in Portadown, County Armagh, Ireland, 66 years ago, and came to Queensland 44 years ago, arriving at Mackay, where he joined his brother, Constable Robert Woodhouse. Joining the Police Force in 1888, he was stationed in Ipswich, and was later transferred to Mackay, as first-class constable. Deceased was later promoted to Acting Sergeant, and was transferred to North Bundaberg, where he was in charge of the station for seven years. He subsequently served in Cairns, and then returned to Brisbane, where he retired 23 years ago owing to ill-health. The late Acting-Sergeant Woodhouse was twice married, and he is survived by his widow and a family of five sons and two daughters. One son was killed in action in the Great War. His eldest son, Lieutenant Edward Woodhouse, is at present managing a plantation in New Guinea. The funeral took place to the Toowong Cemetery, Rev. C. H. Massey officiating at the graveside.

Citation: On 9 March 1989 Mr Viney went with friends to Waitpinga Beach. At about 8.15p.m. he was sitting on his surfboard 200 metres from the shore when he saw one of his friends, 50 metres to his left, go under the water while his surfboard remained on the surface. He came up two seconds later calling out that he had been attacked by a shark. Mr Viney immediately paddled out and when half way there saw the shark's head. On reaching his friend he saw that the shark still had hold of him and he jumped from his board into the bloodstained water alongside him. He kicked where he believed the shark to be until he struck it and continued to kick until it disappeared. His friend, still alive, was in shock and Mr Viney dragged him on to his surfboard and caught a wave. He swam and dragged him to within twenty metres of the shore where two other friends came to his assistance. They dragged the victim to the beach and there unsuccessful attempts to resuscitate him were made. By his actions Mr Viney displayed conspicuous courage in circumstances of great peril.

Stanhope Gold Medal: 9686 - Trevor Allan Viney, SC, student, aged 19 of Christies Beach, SA was surfing on his board at Waitpinga Beach just after sunset on 9 March 1989 with a friend who was about 50m away. Trevor then saw his friend splash into the water off his board and go under for a few seconds. When he broke surface, he called out, 'Shark! There's a shark!' Trevor immediately started paddling to his friend and on the way he saw the white underside of a shark's head, about 50cms across. When he reached his friend struggling in the water, he saw that the shark had his jaws around his friend's thigh. He slipped off his board and started kicking at the shark, feeling the shark's rough skin on his feet. Trevor sensed that the shark then swam away and he got his friend, stiff and shaking as in shock, onto his board, managed to catch a wave that brought him and the man, who later succumbed, to shore.

'Coroner Commends Rescuer's Bravery

"I want to commend you on what I consider a most courageous action. It takes courage to enter water near rocks at any time, but more than usual courage when the water is rough," the Acting District Coroner (Mr. G. Hook, S.M.) told Edward Kenneth Bullough today.

Mr. Hook was inquiring into the death of Rupert Frank Smith, 62, at Red Ochre Beach on Dec. 3. He found that Smith died as a result of being accidentally washed from the rocks by a large wave while fishing. Bullough said he had gone fishing with his father and with Smith, who was his uncle, at the rocks at the northern end of Red Ochre Beach. His father had gone some distance away and he had turned away to re-rig his line, when he heard a noise like an especially large wave hitting the rocks.

He could not see Smith where he had been. He saw him in the water in the middle of the gulf and dived in after him. Bullough said: 'He seemed to be all right and was treading water. I called out to him to keep calm and finally got my arms about him and tried to make way to a point nearby. After some time I got him across to the rocks but because of the back-wash he was unable to get right onto them. A big wave washed us partly on to the rocks, but before I could get him on, he was washed back into the gulf again. I got to him again, but this time he seemed limp. Finally another big wave washed us high on the rocks and I pulled him clear. An ambulance officer and I tried for two hours to revive him but without success.'

Bill's father was a bandsman before him, and Bill was in the famous Parramatta Lancers' Band which was reviewed by Lord Kitchener. Then there is Bill junior. He is now at Tobruk, where he has just spent his 21st birthday as a

signaller. Bill Burgess senior says the band is a most necessary part of Army life. "We used to wake them up in Egypt with military marches during the last big show", he recollects. "Remember how General Tom bridges rallied his weary men of the Guards' Brigade at Mons by playing The British Grenadiers?" That's only one of a hundred reasons why Bill Burgess, the old Anzac with his only son abroad with the A.I.F., feels he is doing his bit by serving in the Australian Military Forces with that excellent combination, the Eastern Command Band.'

He was travelling at about 25 miles an hour. He struck the boy, who was waiting at the stopping-place for a tram, knocking him down. Constable Bush said that the accused was quite sober. At the conclusion of the Crown case, the Jury acquitted the accused without leaving the box.'

The Military Medal presented to Stewart Hull in June 1917 was posted by him by registered mail to Australia. The ship on which the mail was sent was the P. & O. liner S.S. Mongolia that Hull claimed was sunk by the enemy soon after leaving England. The ship struck a mine on 23 June 1917 and sank off the coast of India. Some survivors were saved from the sinking ship but it was not possible to save the mail. Hull was advised in 1920 that he would need to lodge a Statutory Declaration and also pay some money to have the medal replaced. There is no record in his Service File that this ever happened.

THE REV. J. B. RENTOUL ST. ANDREW'S MINISTER

Few citizens of Wagga are better known than the Rev. James Buchan Rentoul, the present minister of St. Andrew's Church.

One need not be an adherent of Presbyterianism to know this lovable character. His is a personality all of its own. He is one of those Englishmen who has an intense love for the old country and the British Empire; but his heart is wrapped up in Australia, and he has a high admiration of Australian youth. When it comes to speaking, he is forceful and dynamic and his phraseology is very fine. Above all, Padre Rentoul, as he is affectionately known by, is sincere.

Born of Scottish parents at Liverpool, England, Mr. Rentoul was educated in Ireland at Erasmus Smith's School in Dublin. Coming to Australia in 1891 with his mother, he settled in Charlton in the Mallee (Victoria), and after remaining in Munro's foundry for two years, entered the old London Bank, where he stayed for four years.

Later he entered upon his theological course at St. Andrew's College, Sydney, and was ordained and inducted at St. Andrew's, Tamworth. After staying four years there, he went to St. Andrew's, Albury, where he remained for five years, and from there went to Chalmer's Church, Hobart. It was while he was at Hobart that he answered the call of King and Country, and he served as chaplain with the 3rd Light Horse in Egypt and with the 21st Battalion in the two battles of the Somme.

On his return from the war, he returned to Hobart, and later became minister at St. George's Church, Geelong, where he was also chaplain of Geelong College, one of the six associated schools of Victoria. From Geelong he came to Wagga, and he is now in his eighth year of ministry at St. Andrew's.

Apart from his work at St. Andrew's, Mr: Rentoul has found time to interest himself in various public matters in Wagga. Education always has his interest, as do youth movements. He is an active member of the Wagga Rotary Club, of which he was vice-president in 1936-37. He is also keenly interested in horticulture, and any movement which has for its object the welfare of Wagga, has the support of Mr. Rentoul. In all matters he has had the assistance and loyalty of his wife, and his daughter. Miss Jean Rentoul, has been a tower of assistance to girl guides and musical circles.

At Ualeb, in Libya, Lieut-Colonel Cooper, with his battalion held his position and denied the use of the Trigh Capuzzo to the enemy from the 27th May to 1st June, 1942.

In the opening phases of the battle a force, which enemy accounts say was an Italian Division, attacked along the Trigh Capuzzo. Lieut-Colonel Cooper, by skilful use of ground, held off all frontal attacks, firstly by means of a small covering force in front of his position, and later by action from his main position. On the 29th May a major enemy attack with tanks and infantry was repulsed with heavy losses to the enemy in men and four tanks were knocked out in front of the position. The enemy never penetrated the position on this front.

On the 30th and 31st May German forces coming up from the rear enveloped Lieut-Colonel Cooper's Northern flank and joined hands with the enemy attacking from the West. The battalion area was now subjected to heavy

artillery fire from the North and West and our supply of ammunition was rapidly diminishing. On the 31st May the enemy breached the Northern front but Lieut-Colonel Cooper quickly restored the position.

It was not until the forenoon of the 1st June when artillery, mortar and small arms ammunition was mostly expended that the unequal struggle went in favour of the enemy, who mounted two simultaneous attacks from the North. In the face of overwhelming enemy forces, the tenacious action of the battalion was due in a great measure to the skill, determination and example shown by Lieut-Colonel Cooper.

As a footnote to the recommendation is written, 'That Colonel Cooper and his battalion maintained his position as long as he did is extraordinary - The Trigh Capuzzo was vital to the defence of this area - on all occasions Col. Cooper set the highest standard of leadership and courage. Recommended for D.S.O.'

Captured in N.Africa in June 1942, Lt.Col. Cooper was sent to Italy. A year later he escaped from Camp 207, Milan, only to be caught as he made his way to the coast.

During his imprisonment at VEANO (Camp 29) he worked ceaselessly to encourage escapes and to raise the morale of the prisoners. Although he was released at the time of the Italian Armistice he was recaptured within a short time by a German patrol. Towards the end of October 1943 during transfer to Germany, Lt.Col. Cooper jumped from the heavily guarded train near Verona. He was seen and fired upon, but was not hit. Whilst making his way South he instructed several partisan hands in the use of weapons; eventually he had to abandon his original objective and make his way to Switzerland.

When the route from Switzerland was opened up in the Autumn of 1944, Lt.Col. Cooper did excellent work in the organisation of the evacuation of all Allied personnel.

At Milne Bay on the afternoon of 4th September, 1942, a company of an Australian Infantry Battalion attacked a Japanese position where it encountered terrific rifle and machine gun fire. Advance of the section of which Corporal French was in command was held up by fire from three enemy machine gun posts, whereupon Corporal French, ordering his section to take cover, advanced and silenced one of the posts with grenades. He returned to his section for more grenades and again advanced and silenced the second post.

Armed with a Thompson sub-machine gun he then attacked the third post, firing from the hip as he went forward. He was seen to be badly hit by fire from this post, but he continued to advance. The enemy gun then ceased to fire and his section pushed on to find all the members of the three enemy crews had been killed and that Corporal French had died in front of the third gunpit.

By his cool courage and disregard of his own personal safety this non-commissioned officer saved members of his section from heavy casualties and was responsible for the successful conclusion of the attack.
