Private Thomas Warburton (recorded as Warbutton on Regimental Pay Lists, also recorded as Killed in Action 18 June 1815) enlisted in the 1st Regiment Dragoon Guards in August 1812. During the Waterloo Campaign in which he served, the regiment which comprised four squadrons formed the centre of the front rank of the Household Brigade under the command of Lord Somerset. When Pack's Brigade was wavering under the numbers of the French force, Uxbridge sent his cavalry in reply. Somerset's Household Brigade scattered the cavalry and infantry on D'Erlon's left and at the same time Ponsonby's Union Brigade ripped into the divisions of Donzelot and Marcognet. The French troops broke and fled in chaos leaving countless dead and about 3,000 prisoners. Emboldened with their success, the two cavalry brigades continued their charge forward attacking the French batteries, oblivious to orders to halt. On spent mounts and in a disorganised state they fell prey themselves to a counterattack by fresh French cavalry and it was here that Warburton lost his commanding officer. As a consequence of a number of counter charges and minor skirmishes throughout the rest of the battle the regiment suffered 275 officers and men killed, wounded or missing.

Thomas Warburton is listed as Killed in Action 18 June 1815 on the Supplementary Pay List and on the Muster Rolls, however this information has not been included on the latest published transcription of the medal roll.

The Waterloo Medal was originally intended to be awarded to all survivors of the battle and to the next of kin of those killed in action or died of wounds. Two separate lists were compiled and by the first anniversary of the battle almost all survivors had received their medals. However the striking and naming from the second list containing the names and regiments of the fatal casualties was initially deferred and then abandoned due to pressure placed on the mint to give priority to the new silver coinage.

Over the course of the next ten years, some families, mainly of officer's lobbied the authorities for their loved one's medal. Each application was carefully vetted and verified and as a result the next of kin of some officers and even fewer other ranks received the medal. As a consequence the Waterloo Medal to casualties is not only scarce, but extremely scarce to other ranks.

Citation: For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led a mixed force in the advance with great gallantry. Later, he maintained his position for two days in the most advanced line and sent back most valuable information.

Bar to MC: Fifth Supplement to LG 25/9/1917, p 9970 - to T./Capt. (A./Maj.) Samuel John Markham Hole, M.C., R.Fus.

Recommendation: Previous to an attack on a crater held by the enemy in No Man's Land he went out in broad daylight and carefully reconnoitered the ground from every point of view, fixing his advanced quarters in a very heavily exposed and shelled area in order to get in close touch with the operation. By his fine example, careful preparations and contempt of danger all ranks were imbued with such irresistible dash and confidence that the operation was a complete success.

Samuel John Markham Hole, independent means, age 22, born at Westminister, London, UK; Enl.29Aug1914 upon discharging as 2Lieut in Grenadier Guards to be appointed to a temporary commission in Royal Fusiliers; to France 16Nov1915; WIA 08Jul1916, GSW to head at Souchez, France; returned to England 06Feb1919; Disch.27Apr1919.

Citation: At the factory of British Oxygen Company, Ltd., one of several hundred steel cylinders which had been filled with acetylene gas slipped out of a man's hands and fell on to a concrete platform. Black smoke poured from the damaged cylinder in considerable volume and the man who had let it slip, and other workers, immediately ran from the room. Johnston and McIndoe, however, realised the very dangerous possibilities of fire or explosion if the damaged cylinder was left beside such a large number of filled cylinders. Without regard to the consequences to themselves they rolled the cylinder, still emitting black smoke and becoming hot, out of the end door of the filling room into the yard. Having got it into a position where, should it explode, it was not likely to affect the other cylinders. Johnston ran for a fire hose. The cylinder, however, was getting hotter and McIndoe shouted a warning and himself moved away from it. The cylinder then exploded. Some damage was done to the structure of nearby buildings, but no one suffered any physical injury. Both Johnston and McIndoe were well aware of the danger of fire and explosion, but with great courage and coolness they instantly took steps to remove the damaged cylinder in order to minimise the effect of any explosion that might occur. During the time it took to roll the cylinder a distance of about 40 yards they were in imminent danger of losing their lives or of being severely injured.

Citation: 'For his gallant conduct at the attack at Te Papa, Tauranga, on the 29th of April last, in entering the Pah with Commander Hay, and when that Officer was mortally wounded, bringing him out, although ordered by Commander Hay to leave him, and seek his own safety. This man was at the time 'Captain of the Foretop' of the "Harrier" doing duty as Captain's Coxswain; and Commodore Sir William Wiseman brings his name to special notice for his act of gallantry.'

Captain Samuel Mitchell, V.C., was born at Apsley, Woburn, Bedfordshire on 8 September 1841, the son of a labourer. He joined the Royal Navy as a Boy Second Class in August 1857. He completed his gunnery course at H.M.S. Excellent in 1859 and joined H.M.S. Harrier on commissioning at Portsmouth in August 1860. Shortly afterwards he was appointed captain of the mizzen-top.

H.M.S. Harrier served in New Zealand during 1863 and 1864, her crew taking part in the Waikato Campaign and was present at Rangiriri and other places in that district where some of his shipmates and crew were killed. When the campaign was changed to the East Coast, the Harrier, then under the command of Commander Hay was ordered to Tauranga, where the men were landed and formed part of the Naval Brigade.

On 29 April 1864, Samuel Mitchell was one of the men formed to the shore party. They dashed up the hill of the pa and eventually climbed over its steep walls. The Maoris alerted to the shore party's presence fired upon them from well entrenched positions. In the ensuing exchange of fire, Commander Hay was mortally wounded. Mitchell immediately grabbed the officer onto his back and made his way to the rear despite the Commander's orders to leave him and seek safety. The Commander was carried on board the Harrier, but nothing could be done. The Commander directed his officers to request that the Queen should confer the Victoria Cross upon Mitchell for his gallant conduct. Commander Hay died from his wounds some 36 hours later.

Samuel Mitchell left H.M.S. Harrier as Bosun's Mate on paying off in March 1865. On discharge from the Royal Navy in May 1866 he migrated to New Zealand hoping to make his fortune in the West Coast gold rush. During his

travel to New Zealand via Sydney, Australia his sea chest was lost, with all his possessions including his Victoria Cross group, in Sydney. The Victoria Cross was later discovered for sale in England and after much negotiating it was finally acquired by Samuel Mitchell's daughter, Edith, in 1928. Samuel Mitchell settled down as a farmer at Hokitika in New Zealand's South Island. He married Agnes (nee Ross) in 1869 and they had eleven children, all of whom were born in New Zealand. Samuel Mitchell VC was drowned in the Mikonui River on 16 March 1894 at the age of 52 and his wife, Agnes, died at Ross on 23 October 1918 at the age of 71. They are buried together at Ross Cemetery, Ross, New Zealand.

Upon the death of Samuel Mitchell's daughter, Edith, the Victoria Cross was gifted to the West Coast Historical Museum at Hokitika, New Zealand in trust for all descendents of the time being of Samuel Mitchell.

There have been other reports of a Victoria Cross named to Samuel Mitchell appearing in Canada and despite being sold it was eventually examined by the firm of Hancocks, London, the firm responsible for making Victoria Crosses, who in 1956 declared it a replica.

John Stacpole was born 27 December 1847 at Hollymount, County Mayo, Ireland. He enlisted on 23 November 1865 in the 88th Regiment of Foot (Connaught Rangers) as a private. He served in India for several years and after arriving home was commissioned as a sub-lieutenant in the 75th (Stirlingshire) Regiment of Foot on 21 January 1874 and then commissioned as a full lieutenant on 11 May 1875. He served in various postings and then on 10 April 1882 he was seconded as a Deputy Assistant Commissary General (DACG) and promoted to captain on 26 March 1884. He served at this rank at the port of Suakin at the time of the Soudan expedition. On 11 December 1888 he was attached to the Army Service Corps and was appointed Deputy Assistant Adjutant General (DAAG) in the North-East District on 1 July 1889.

On 11 May 1891 he was promoted to major with the Royal Welsh Fusiliers. On 2 April 1892 he became DAAG in the Home District until 30 June 1894 and then on 15 September 1895 he was appointed DAAG in the Southern District based at Portsmouth. He was promoted to Lieutenant-Colonel with the Army Service Corps on 13 November 1895 and in this role was the

embarkation officer at Southampton Docks. During the Boer War he and his staff oversaw the embarkation of 300,000 men and 32,000 horses without any casualties. He was promoted to brevet colonel on 28 March 1900 and as a colonel on the staff on 9 August of the same year.

He was appointed a Commander of the Royal Victorian Order on 19 March 1901 with a private presentation ceremony held on board the Royal Yacht, Victoria & Albert, at Portsmouth where King Edward VII thanked him for the 'zeal and fidelity he had displayed in the exercise of his arduous and responsible duties as Embarkation Officer.' Then on 26 June 1902 he was appointed a Companion of the Order of St Michael and St George. He retired shortly before his 57th birthday on 23 November 1904 and was then appointed a Justice of the Peace. In April 1905 he came out of retirement and was appointed District Barrack Master, Eastern Command until he retired again on 30 November 1907.

During World War I John Stacpole was appointed Commandant of the rest camp at Highfield near Southampton Common. Towards the end of 1916 he was taken ill with appendicitis and died at the Red Cross Hospital on 30 December at the age of 69. His funeral was conducted with 'imposing military ceremony.'

John Christopher Edmonds was born on 23 June 1921, the son of a naval officer. He was educated at Kelly College in Tavistock, Devon and after finishing school, like his father, he also joined the Royal Navy. During World War II he saw action in the Norwegian Campaign in 1940 and then in 1941 served in the battleship Warspite in the Battle of Cape Matapan. He spent two years on the cruiser Phoebe overseeing the evacuation from Crete before the cruiser was torpedoed off Tobruk and sent to New York for repairs. On returning to the Mediterranean in 1942 the Phoebe took part in Operation Pedestal, the last great Malta convoy. Later she was torpedoed for a second time off Pointe Noire in West Africa with 52 crew members killed.

At some stage of the war Edmonds was sent to the USA as part of a team of young and personable officers who had seen action. Their task was to drum up support for the British war effort but Edmonds considered it a waste of time. After a stint as an instructor at the HMS King Alfred training establishment at Hove, he passed Staff College in 1946 and was sent to Hong Kong on the staff of the Commander-in-Chief. At the time of the Suez crisis he was on the staff of the C-in-C Home Fleet but as he disapproved of the venture he decided to leave the Navy and apply for the Diplomatic Service.

He took the Foreign Office exam in 1958 passing out on top ahead of several Oxbridge Firsts. His naval training never left him and he was a stickler for protocol. He joined the Foreign Office in September 1959 and was appointed desk officer for Yemen and Saudi Arabia. After serving as First Secretary Commercial in Tokyo in 1960-62 and as head of the international section of the Foreign Office's Information Research Department in 1963-67 he then went as First Secretary and Head of Chancery to Ankara. He remained there for four years and was promoted to counsellor and periodically as charge d'affaires.

Edmonds took up his post as head of the Arms Control and Disarmament Department in 1975 at a critical time in the Cold War. He was heavily involved in negotiations with the Russians on achieving a Test Ban Treaty. He was deputy to Sir Percy Cradock, the leader of the UK delegation however the talks stalled. Edmonds replaced Cradock as leader of the UK Delegation in 1978 however leadership changes in America and the UK resulted in talks coming to an end although they were resumed in the 1990s. When he returned to London Edmonds wrote a paper on negotiating with the Russians and it is still valid today.

John Edmonds retired in 1981 although he continued to be involved in advising politicians on foreign affairs. He was a member of various non-governmental organisations including serving as chairman of the Council for Arms Control from 1990 to 1996. His family life included a marriage in 1948 to Baroness Elena Tornow of Baltic nobility. This marriage was dissolved in 1966 and he then married Armine Williams who died in 2005. John Christopher Edmonds died on 17 August 2015.

Citation: This officer has completed many sorties on his third tour of operations during which he has attacked a wide range of targets, including Berlin, Frankfurt and Stuttgart and other well-defended targets in Germany. He has at all times displayed outstanding keenness and his determination to press home his attacks has earned him many successes. Flying Officer Botha has rendered loyal and devoted service and his example has been most inspiring.

Recommendation (by Group Captain J.N.Jefferson, Commanding RAF Station, Skellingthorpe): Flying Officer Botha, who has done two previous tours of operations as an Air Gunner, has now completed 18 successful sorties as pilot and has attacked such targets as Berlin (twice), Stuttgart (3 times), Frankfurt (twice), Leipzig and Schweinfurt. On the night of 22/23rd March, 1944, Flying Officer Botha was detailed for an attack on Frankfurt. Shortly after take-off his port inner engine became unserviceable due to a leak in the pipe line between the master fuel cock and the engine. The aircraft was at a height of 15,000 feet when the incident occurred. Finding that he was unable to maintain height on three engines with the full bomb load, Flying Officer Botha gave instructions to jettison 4 cans on incendiary bombs. In spite of this set-back and, although his aircraft had not yet crossed enemy territory, he decided to continue and attack the target. When he found that by sticking to the original route he would be unable to maintain the planned time at the turning point, he directed the navigator to give him a course which would take him straight to the target; this involved flying across the Ruhr. The aircraft arrived over the target some ten minutes after the last time of bombing and at a height of only 10,000 feet. Nevertheless, FlyingOfficer Botha pressed home his attack and obtained a photograph of the target conditions. His cool determination in spite of enemy opposition has always been noteworthy and his enthusiasm for attacking the enemy has been a splendid example. For his outstanding devotion to duty he is strongly recommended for the award of the Distinguished Flying Cross.

Remarks by Base Commander (Air Commodore A.Heskell, No. 53 Base, Waddington): In my experience the case of F/Lt. Botha is unique as being the first Air Gunner to complete two operational tours and then return for a third tour as Captain of a heavy Bomber. I can confirm all that the Station Commander writes of him and consider that the award of the Distinguished Flying Cross would be suitable recognition for outstanding service. Very strongly recommended. It is regretted that more details of this officer's earlier tours are not available.

Remarks by Air or other Officer commanding (AVM R.A.Cochrane, No.5 Group): This officer has a magnificent operational record. He served in Coastal Command between April and November 1940, completing 30 trips on Ansons and Beauforts. From November 1940 until August 1941 he completed 45 trips on Wellington aircraft in Bomber Command, all the sorties being undertaken as an Air Gunner. He has now completed 18 sorties as pilot and captain of aircraft

Robert Walton was born 17 January 1922 at Alston, Cumberland, England. He left school at the age of 14 to work as an apprentice electrician in the local lead mine. In June 1939 at the age of 17 he fulfilled his long held ambition by volunteering to join the Royal Air Force. He was initially trained as an air gunner and then as a wireless operator on Wellington bombers and Liberators with Coastal Command, 221 and 120 Squadrons patrolling the North Atlantic protecting shipping convoys against seaborne and airborne attacks. He was later posted to 511 Squadron at Lyneham employed on VIP duties and had the privilege of serving on the flights transporting members of the Royal family after the war as well as flying Winston Churchill to Moscow for a conference in 1942. He told his son that on one such trip, after a night stop, he awoke early to check the aircraft's radio equipment and found Churchill wandering around the airfield alone and much to Churchill's amusement and pleasure he told Walton that he had managed to slip his security guards.

On the trip to Moscow, British Intelligence requested that Walton noted the Russian radio frequencies because there was a lack of information about them. He dutifully recorded the frequencies in a log book and then hid it in the middle of the Westinghouse generator on board the plane because the crew were searched before disembarking and embarking. When he was on board for the return flight home he recovered the hidden log book only to discover that all the pages that had the frequencies recorded had been carefully removed with a razor.

Sgt Walton was mentioned in despatches for brave conduct in May 1943 and, now a Flight Lieutenant, was awarded the AFC in 1945. He continued to serve after the war and transferred to the Secretarial Branch in 1952. He resigned his commission in January 1971 and after working for Barclays for a short time he was employed by the National Health Service managing groups of hospitals up until he retired. Walton's son, Philip, served in the RAF for nearly 20 years and his father-in-law, Charles Hayman, was a founding member of the RAF on 1 April 1918 having served as an aircraft engineer in the RNAS during WWI. He went on to attain the rank of Wing Commander and after leaving the service became a member of the Air Accidents Investigation Branch. Robert Walton died on 13 September 2002 at age 80 in Ledbury, Herefordshire where he had retired with his wife, Jean, and she later died on 24 April 2016 at age 95.

Albert Hughes was presented with the DSC at an Investiture at Buckingham Palace on 9 March 1943.

Lloyd's War Medal for Bravery at Sea: Lloyd's List & Shipping Gazette 3/2/1944, the joint citation states as follows.

'The vessel was attacked by enemy aircraft almost continuously for five days and nights while proceeding to a North Russian port. Two of the enemy were destroyed. After the attack ceased, enemy submarines were sighted and a nearby vessel was torpedoed. By taking evasive action and increasing speed to the utmost, Captain Hervey was able to get away from the enemy. Throughout the whole period of the attacks Chief Engineer Hughes and Second Engineer Griffiths remained in the engine-room, and by their efforts ensured the utmost possible speed under conditions of great stress. Although almost overcome by lack of sleep they carried on with the pumping out of water ballast and the handling of the main engines until the vessel was refloated. It was mainly due to the inspiring leadership and courage of the Master and the magnificent conduct of the two engineer officers that the ship was brought to port. Chief Steward Carswell behaved with outstanding courage in the face of great danger when a gunner was wounded during the action with enemy aircraft. He made his way to the gun position and carried the gunner down to the ship's hospital. There he inserted sixteen stitches in the man's leg while the attack on the vessel proceeded. But for the prompt action and skill of Mr. Carswell, the wounded man might have lost his life.'

Chief Engineer Officer Albert Henry Hughes, aged 46, was later killed-in-action while serving on S.S.Nebraska which was torpedoed by the submarine U-843 off Ascension Island on 8 April 1944. He was one of two men killed in the explosion caused by the initial torpedo strike and two further attacks by the U-Boat resulted in the sinking of the Nebraska. He is commemorated on the Tower Hill Memorial in London.

DFC: Supplement to LG 21/4/1944, p1837 - to Pilot Officer Arthur William Fearn (159883), RAF Volunteer Reserve, No.57 Squadron.

Recommendation: P/O Fearn was posted to No.57 Squadron from 1662 Con. Unit on the 28th June 1943. He has taken a part in attacks against many strongly defended targets in Germany, including 8 of the recent attacks on Berlin. P/O Fearn has shown courage and resolution throughout his tour. His example has been responsible for the excellent offensive spirit in his crew. P/O Fearn is strongly recommended for the award of DFC.

Arthur William Fearn joined the RAF in October 1941. He trained in Tiger Moths with 2 EFTS, then trained in America in Vultee BT13 then returned to England with No.6 AFU (Advanced Flying Unit) and was posted to 27 OTU (Operational Training Unit). He flew a Wellington to Paris on a leaflet raid, then on 1 July 1943 he was posted to Scampton with No.57 Squadron (Lancasters). His first operational flight was to Cologne on 3 July 1943 followed by further operations in the next few months. On 4 October 1943 during an operation to Frankfurt his aircraft encountered a German JU88 over the channel and his aircraft was holed by flak. In November 1943 he flew four operations in 8 days taking part in the Battle of Berlin with a total of 8 operations over Berlin between November 1943 and January 1944.

He flew a total of 21 operations with 57 Squadron before being posted to 617 (Dambuster) Squadron in February 1944. His first flight on 23 March 1944 was on a special operation to the Aero Works in Lyons, followed by two further operations to Lyons a few days later. Then on 5 April he flew another special operation on an aircraft factory in Toulouse followed by operations over Villacoublay (near Paris), Brunswick and Munich. In May the squadron was preparing for the D-Day landings and on 5/6 June launched a special operation with the co-operation of the Sea-Borne Forces to fly a decoy mission. The squadron flew in a low-level box pattern thus affecting the German radar with the radar operators believing that the invasion fleet was heading for Le Havre and not Normandy.

On 8 June the squadron bombed the Saumer Railway Tunnel as the allied commander believed the Germans would use the tunnel to move a Panzer unit to the Normandy battlefield. This operation marked the end of Fearn's 1st Tour of Operations and his log book is signed by Wing Commander Leonard Cheshire VC. Cheshire normally asked crews if they wanted to continue on operations and Fearn elected to continue and on 14 June 1944 flew over Le Havre destroying U Boats and E Boat Pens with the new tallboy bombs. As similar operation followed on the next day over Boulogne and on 20 July during a special operation in the Pas de Calais area Fearn records 'target obscured by the cloud, ordered to bring 'bombs' back, landed with some 60,000 lbs. Saw first Buzz-Bomb crossing sea, over coast, then destroyed by Ack-Ack fire.'

On 25 July Fearn's aircraft was hit by flak over the target, the bomb release cable was severed and they were unable to aim bombs so they released them manually. Fearn flew 45 operations with 24 of them with 617 Squadron, the last operation with that squadron was on 18 August 1944. He was then posted as a flying instructor and then to Coastal Command Development Unit before returning to an operational squadron, No.15 Squadron, in June 1945. The final entry in Fearn's log book is on 29 January 1946 and he flew a total of 1,124 hours 51 minutes.

Sgt Frank Hide 14610920, served in World War 2 with 4 Troop 1 Commando Regiment. He died 7 August 1992 with the funeral service held at Holy Trinity, Stevenage. A newspaper article on his death reads as follows. 'Ex-Councillor dies aged 75. A former chairman of Stevenage Borough Council, who was involved in the creation of the new town, has died at the age of 75. Frank Hide, of Longthorne Avenue, Stevenage, died on Friday August 7, just five days after celebrating his 46th wedding anniversary. He was also a Labour councillor for many years after being elected in 1953. One of his daughters, Doreen Loose, said among the many committees he sat on was the planning committee when the council was planning and developing the new town of Stevenage. In 1959, as chairman of the council, he escorted the Queen when she visited the town.

During the war years Mr Hide served with the British number one Commandos in Norway, Egypt, India, Burma, Ceylon and Hong Kong. He came close to death while suffering from malaria in Burma but survived to collect a number of medals including the Burma Star. He leaves a widow, Anne, three daughters and a son.'

'As liaison officer for HQ 7th Indian Infantry Brigade attached to 1 Royal Sussex during the night 5/6th April 1943 for the attack on the Dj El Meida Hill, north-west of Wadi Akarit, at 0954 and on the anti-tank ditch defences at 106548.

From 0040 hours 6th April the Battalion was under very heavy mortar and machine gun fire throughout the night and Captain Hawkes coolness was an example to all ranks. Just before first light seeing that fire was still coming from the right of the Battalion's objective he collected together a party of men, ordered them to fix bayonets and led them forward to clear the remainder of the objective.

This they did after some resistance and they captured several prisoners and a troop of 75mm guns. Captain Hawkes then assisted in getting these guns into action against the enemy and the right flank who were holding up the 50th Division attack. His party was then shelled and heavily fired on by machine guns. The latter he dealt with by rifle fire.

Captain Hawkes bravery, initiative, and leadership very materially contributed to the successful capture of the right of the Battalion's objective which in turn prevented fire from the area being directed on the 50 Division

Recommendation by Lt Col C.E.A. Firth for an immediate award - approved by General B.L.Montgomery, Commander-in-Chief, Middle East Forces.

Geoffrey William Hawkes was born 31 January 1920. He served with Royal Sussex Regiment, the Parachute Regiment, was with the Training Team Iraq and G.S.O.1 (Int./Pl.) Central Recce Estab. R.A.F. He died 25 September 1991 having never married.

Roderick Jessel Anidjar Romain was born in London on 2 December 1916, the younger son of a Jewish solicitor, Artom Romain, who represented criminals. He was educated at Malvern College and Sidney Sussex College in Cambridge from where he graduated in law in 1938. By then war seemed inevitable so he enlisted in the Territorial Army with the Honourable Artillery Company. He was called to the Bar in 1939 but only appeared in court four times before the outbreak of World War II.

He was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant (No.126222) into the Royal Artillery in the London Gazette of 2 April 1940 and posted to the 27th Field Regiment. He then saw service in France with the British Expeditionary Force and participated in the fighting in Belgium and northern France and the retreat to Dunkirk before being evacuated on the paddle steamer Sandown Castle. From April 1942 he saw service in North Africa with the 8th Army assigned to the Judge Advocate General's Department, prosecuting and defending in several serious cases, despite his lack of experience.

He moved with the 8th Army through Italy and with the war's end he found himself as Judge Advocate in Germany, and conducted two war crime trials in June 1946 and January 1947. The first was of six Germans for the murder of a British airman who had been shot down over northern Germany in March 1945 and baled out only to be beaten to death while on the ground. One man was sentenced to death by hanging and the others received lengthy sentences of imprisonment. The second trial concerned the activities at Neuengamme forced labour camp where the seven defendants worked at a camp providing workers for a local arms factory. One defendant was sentenced to death and executed and three others were sentenced to fifteen years' imprisonment.

Romain was promoted to Major in 1949 before returning home to resume his career at the Bar in London but found professional life difficult so he joined his father's firm of solicitors, Freke Palmer Romain. In 1947 he was approached by Jews from what was then Palestine who wanted to recruit former British soldiers to fight to create a Jewish state. Despite being Jewish, he declined, stating that he had fought for King and Country for six years and was not then going to fight against them. In 1956, when many Spanish and Portuguese Jews had to flee Egypt following the Suez Crisis, he was heavily involved in their support and integration into the community and he was also instrumental in setting up the Wembley Sephardi Synagogue.

In 1971 Roddy Romain, as he was known, became a stipendiary magistrate, a position in which he gained a reputation for courtesy and fairness and was particularly lenient in sentencing those in possession of small amounts of cannabis. The London magazine, Time Out, ranked his Marylebone Magistrates' Court as top of the list from this point of view. He retired in 1983 and spent his time playing golf, walking on Hampstead Heath or relaxing at his club, the Garrick. Roddy Romain died on 11 September 2009. With research.

Arthur Gordon Cheston was born on 6 October 1917. He was known as George while at school, but to all others as Gordon. When at school he excelled at maths and was interested in jazz as well as classical music. He joined the army on 4 September 1939, serving with The Queen's Royal Regiment. This included service at Tobruk and Syria. 2/Lt Cheston was in the Carrier Platoon of the battalion and at the Battle of Sidi Barrani he took a number of Italian prisoners and at Tobruk, along with Sgt Charlie Cronk and the Carrier Platoon, he showed great enterprise in engaging the more heavily armed armoured cars. For this action he was Mentioned in Despatches.

Towards the end of the war he was in Germany and met his future wife, Catherine who was working in the Control Commission. Later they married and Gordon started an accountancy practice. He retired to East Sussex and served for many years as secretary of the Hurst Johnian Club. He died in 2010.

Recommendation: 'Sjt Piddington landed with 2nd Bn. Royal Ulster Rifles on "D" Day. He has never since that date missed an attack through leave, sickness or any other cause, and has always been the first to volunteer for any special task. He has made a name for himself amongst his comrades for his cheerfulness, leadership and personal courage. Owing to casualties he has frequently acted as Pl Comd and done extremely well. On 27 Feb 45 during the attack on the Udem-Weeze road Sjt Piddington was acting Pl Comd. He led his Pl, with considerable dash and gallantry, on to the objective which was captured in the face of heavy opposition. On consolidation he continuously moved about from sec to sec under considerable shell and mortar fire reorganising the depleted secs and arranging for the evacuation of the wounded.

On the night 24/25 Apr during the attack on Kattenturm, Sgt Piddington was severely shaken by the blast from a panzerfaust which wounded his Pl Comd. He suffered for some time from concussion but, on hearing that his Pl Comd had been evacuated, he immediately returned to lead his Pl on to its objective. Sjt Piddington has on all occasions set an outstanding example in battle. His Pl has seen many actions since D Day but not without loss, for Sjt Piddington, with one other Rifleman, are now the only survivors of the original Pl.'

Testimonial from Commander of 2/R.U.Rifles - 'C/Sgt. Piddington MM joined the Army in April 1940. After having served in N. Africa he landed in Normandy on 'D' Day and went right through the fighting to VE Day, serving all the time in a rifle platoon. His fine record under active adverse conditions has been recognized with the award of the M.M. for personal bravery. He is intelligent and quick, and a good worker in an office. He is looked upon with the greatest admiration and respect by all ranks. C/Sgt. Piddington is a clean, smart man, very reliable and honest, and a most conscientious worker, who can be relied upon to carry out his job without supervision.'

George Charles Piddington, shop assistant, born 27 February 1920 and enlisted at Armagh, Northern Ireland on 17 April 1940 for the duration of the war. He was released from service on 27 May 1946 with military conduct recorded as 'Exemplary'. George Piddington died in November 2002 at the age of 82. His brother, Rifleman Stanley John Piddington was KIA 28 June 1944 serving with 2 Bn The London Rifle Brigade and was buried at St Manvieu War Cemetery, Cheux, France.

Charles Arthur Wiard was the son of a Freeman of the City of London and when his father died in 1922 he and his three younger sisters were placed into the Freeman's Orphan School at Brixton. He won a number of prizes, both academic and athletic, including the Lord Mayor's Prize for the most deserving scholar leaving school. He commenced service with the Corporation of London in the Mayor's and City of London Court in 1927 and also maintained his interest in athletics by joining the Blackheath Harriers in 1928.

Wiard was selected as 1st Reserve for England in the 1934 Empire Games and was the 100 and 200 yards county champion for Kent from 1936 to 1938. He was also selected to represent Great Britain as a member of the 4 X 100 metres relay team at the 1936 Berlin Olympics. He ran the first leg in heat 2 but unfortunately the team did not qualify for the final. When he returned to England he continued to compete for both club and country and as a member of the Blackheath Harriers 4 X 110 yards relay time was winner of the English Championship in 1937.

He joined the Auxiliary Air Force in 1938 and the following year was mobilised as an AC2. He survived injuries during the blitz in 1940 and was hospitalised for 8 weeks and then in October 1940 he was commissioned as a Flying Officer in the Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve. He served as second in command of the RAF Seaborne Party, as part of the Servicing Commandos, for Operation Jubilee - the Dieppe Raid on 19 August 1942.

Later in the war he served as part of No.18 RAF Staging Post in conjunction with the Dutch Underground and was in the Hague to help distribute food to the starving population during the severe winter of 1944-45. Wiard was promoted to Flying Officer in January 1949 and was awarded the Air Efficiency Award the following year.

After his war-time service Wiard returned to employment with the Guildhall and was appointed Principal Assistant to the Clerk and Superintendent Billingsgate and Leadenhall Markets in 1949. In 1956 he was appointed Clerk and Superintendent of the same markets and he held this post until his retirement in 1979.

Charles Wiard held a number of positions during his life including President of the Blackheath Harriers, President of the Old Freemen's Association, Vice President of the Kent County Athletic Association, Vice President, Chairman and Trustee of Billingsgate Christian Mission and Dispensary, Committee of Management and Treasurer of Fishmongers and Poulterers Institution, Liveryman of the Fishmongers Company, Past Master of Billingsgate Ward Club, Past Master of Lime Street Ward Club, Past Master of The Worshipful Company of Poulterers, Freeman of the Worshipful Company of Merchant Taylors, Churchwarden at St Andrew Hubbard - City of London, Member of Parochial Church Council St Mary-at-Hill, City of London and while in office he was Market Superintendent Chairman of Joint Market Labour Committee. He died in Bromley, Kent in 1994.

John William Holley Murdin was born on 29 February 1924 at Bedford, England. He enlisted in the RAF in 1941 and commenced operational flying as a Sergeant Navigator with 622 Squadron in June 1944. He completed 31 Ops with 622 Sqn before being posted to the Far East where he was awarded the General Service Medal with clasp SE Asia 1945-46. After WWII he remained in the RAF and served as a Warrant Officer Navigator with 230 OCU at RAF Wymeswold in July 1947. Following wartime reductions he reverted to Navigator II (Sgt equivalent) and went on to serve as a navigator with the Royal Aircraft Research Establishment at Farnborough and at their research site at RAF Thurleigh.

Now a Pilot Officer he was awarded the AFM in the 1958 New Year's Honours List and it is likely this award was for his work with the Royal Air Force Establishment. He was posted to the Blind Landing Experimental Unit (BLEU) and this team was awarded the Cumberbatch Trophy for its outstanding contribution to air safety in 1963 by the Duke of Edinburgh. A group photo of the BLEU team with trophy in front of Varsity WF417 is included with lot with Murdin seated in the front row, sixth from right.

Following his work with BLEU, Murdin was involved in the Oklahoma Thunderstorm Project with the USAF's Aeronautical Systems Division Flight Test Organisation. This was a large-scale, multi-agency meteorological study to investigate the causes and characteristics of thunderstorms. The study became known as the Thunderstorm Project and in 1965 the Royal Aircraft Establishment set five RAF aircrew to assist in the project and Flt Lt Murdin was one of the navigators in the team. On completion of the project a plaque was presented to the Royal Aircraft Establishment by Major General Charles H. Terhune jnr, Commander of the USAF Aeronautical Systems Division in recognition of their involvement. Flt Lt Murdin is one of the names on the plaque.

Murdin then worked with the Experimental Flying Department at RAE Farnborough until he requested retirement in 1973 having served as a navigator with the RAF for 32 years. After retirement he spent 10 years with the National Health Service and finally retired as district manager with Bedford Hospital. He died suddenly on 4 February 1988 at the age of 63 at his home in Higham Ferrers in Northamptonshire (Note: His wife Gwen was the Mayor of Higham Ferrers in 1971-2 and 1980-1 - lot includes colour photo of Murdin and his wife in Mayoral robes). His funeral service was held on 9 February at St Mary's Church, Higham Ferrers followed by a cremation at the Kettering Crematorium.

Elder son of Mr and Mrs K.Cannon, who's other son is minesweeping in the R.N., Pte Cannon attended Waller Street School, and before joining up was working for Percival Aircraft Ltd. He is aged 21.'

The 3rd Battalion was almost completely wiped out and many of the men from the battalion were killed, wounded or taken as prisoners of war. Pte B.F.Cannon was lucky enough to escape by swimming the Rhine River. The survivors of the battle finally made it back to the UK and their unit was amalgamated with the 2nd Battalion and they were sent to Palestine in 1945.

James Francis Bernard 'Paddy' Delany commenced flight training with the RAF in June 1945 on Tiger Moths and Harvards, then transferred to Ansons at No.3 School at Leuchars. When his training was completed he transferred to 203 Squadron at St Eval flying Lancasters. In 1951 he joined the School of Maritime Reconnaissance at St Mawgan and in June 1953 he moved to the Air Sea Warfare Development Unit flying Shakletons. In August 1956 he moved to 242 OCU Dishfort and soon after to 99 Squadron at Lyneham from where he flew to Cyprus. He continued with various flights to the UK, Africa, Australia and Cyprus until May 1961.

He then flew an Argosy with 114 Squadron carrying out training in parachute drops before joining 105 Squadron in October 1964 at Khormaksar in Aden, Yemen. In June 1967 he returned to the UK to the Air Training Squadron at Brize Norton flying VC10s. When his training was complete he joined 10 Squadron at Brize Norton. This squadron became involved with VIP transport and aeromedical evacuations. In January 1971 he transferred to 241 OCU at Brize Norton. He finished flying for the RAF in July 1974 having completed 11,774.20 hours. He was then based at RAF Northolt briefing pilots involved with Royal Flights (a newspaper cutting is included with the lot showing Paddy Delany briefing pilots who were to fly members of the Royal Family).

Patrick Billy Hawker, nickname 'Laz' had a long and distinguished career in the Royal Air Force, primarily as a Navigator. His log books commence with a flight on an Avro Anson as a bomb aimer on 17 June 1946. The log records his training to become a navigator as well as a radio operator including flying on Ansons, Wellingtons and Mosquitos. In May 1949 he was attached to 202 Squadron at Aldergrove flying in a Halifax as part of operation Bismuth. Then followed service with 39 Squadron at RAF Fayidin Egypt, service in Nicosia and by 1951 he had accumulated 734 flying hours. He then acted as an instructor on Bristol Brigands and later flew in Meteors with 85 Squadron. He then served with 60 Squadron in Leeming and then Tengah in Meteors with 209 Squadron. When he left that squadron, Squadron Leader Crook noted, 'I have been most impressed with the very competent and loyal manner in which Fl.Lt. Hawker has always completed his duties on 209 Squadron. His consistent conscientiousness as an independent detachment commander on active service in Borneo and as the Squadron Deputy Navigation Leader has been most commendable.' His log books end with a flight on 11 November 1967 in a Wessex II. The total flying hours for his career being 3,116.86 hours in daylight and 580.7 at night. Flt Lt P.B. Hawker AFM retired at his own request on 15 March 1969.

Edward Lake was born in 1946 and served in the Royal Navy initially as an Able Seaman serving in Aden during the period 1 August 1964 to 30 November 1967. He then saw service during the conflict in Northern Ireland. While serving as a Petty Officer on the frigate, HMS Alert, he qualified for the Royal Naval Long Service and Good Conduct Medal prior to the frigate being sold off in 1971. He then went on to serve in the Falklands War aboard the type 21 frigate, HMS Antelope.

HMS Antelope saw heavy engagements during the Falklands War while employed on air defence duty at the entrance to San Carlos Water and on 23 May 1982 came under attack by four Argentine A-4B Skyhawks of Grupo5 suffering serious damage and after the attack was left with two unexploded bombs in its hull. Despite the best efforts of the bomb disposal unit, one of whom was killed and another injured, one of the bombs exploded causing a fire and the next day HMS Antelope sank. PO Lake survived the sinking. When he retired Edward Lake lived at Torpoint near Plymouth, Devon and died on 24 February 2015.

The British passenger ship, S.S. Titanic was the luxurious and supposedly publicised as practically unsinkable liner which sank after hitting an iceberg in the North Atlantic off the coast of Newfoundland on its maiden voyage from Southampton, England to New York City, USA. This disaster led to the deaths of over 1,500 passengers and crew. The event has been the subject of 18 movies and numerous television features between 1912 up to 2018 with perhaps the most exciting being that made in 1997 simply titled 'Titanic', made by James Cameron and starring Leonardo DiCaprio and Kate Winslett.

Arthur Henry Rostron (1869-1940) was captain of the Cunard Line's R.M.S. Carpathia when a distress signal was received from the White Star liner S.S. Titanic on 15 April 1912. The Titanic had struck an iceberg and was sinking rapidly. Immediately Captain Rostron ordered his ship to speed to aid the Titanic. This was a huge risk because his ship was racing through icy waters at night but he knew what was at stake with a large passenger liner sinking in freezing water in the middle of the Atlantic. It took 3 1/2 hours to reach the Titanic's radioed position and during that time his orders and preparation would later prove to have saved lives. His crew prepared blankets, food and drinks and subsequently rescued hundreds of survivors from the freezing waters. Captain Rostron was honored with the Congressional Gold Medal, the Thanks of Congress, the American Cross of Honor, and medals by the Liverpool and New York Shipwreck Societies. He would eventually rise to the position of Commodore of the Cunard Line and also served as a British Naval Officer during WWI.

J.Watt was born in Barrow on the west coast of Lancashire, England in 1889. At the age of 11 he proved himself to be a good swimmer when he gained first place in an event at the Aquatic Sports staged by the Barrow Amateur Athletic Association in August 1900.

He joined the Merchant Navy, signing on with the Liverpool based Cunard Line where he served as a waiter. On 7 February 1912 he transferred from the S.S. Bohemian to the R.M.S. Carpathia. He was still with the Carpathia two months later when, on 12 April 1912, the S.S. Titanic sank and the captain, officers and crew of the Carpathia rescued 705 people from the Titanic's complement of 2,340. After landing the survivors at New York, USA on 18 April 1912 the Carpathia continued on its way.

The next time the Carpathia stopped at New York was on 29 May 1912 at which time the Titanic Survivors' Committee presented medals to the captain, officers and crew who had been on the Carpathia at the time of Titanic's sinking and the subsequent rescue. J.Watt was one of those so honoured. The medals were struck in gold, silver and bronze and awarded according to rank, thus J.Watt was a recipient of a bronze medal.

Watt discharged from service with the Carpathia on 1 January 1913 in Liverpool, England. In 1933 at the age of 44 he received the Royal Life Saving Society Award of Merit Medal for aquatic life saving proficiency.

DEATH OF MR. W. EADIE, VICTORIA PARK CARETAKER,

SOLDIER AND STUD GROOM

While it was not unexpected, the death at 12.45 on Monday morning last at the District Hospital, of Mr. W. Eadie, former caretaker of Victoria Park, has occasioned widespread and profound expressions of regret in the community. He was an old gentleman and the work he had done in Victoria Park will stand for many years as a memorial to him in Yass.

There are a few men in every community who are, because of some inborn characteristic, liked by every one, and Bill Eadie, familiarly but respectfully known as "Old Bill," was such a man in Yass. Like the hundreds of thoroughbreds he cared for during his lifetime, he too came from good stock. The late Mr. Eadie, it will be remembered, was the unfortunate victim of a motor car accident during the rain last Sunday week night. He was walking back to his residence in Victoria Park when he was struck by a motor car in Laidlaw Street and sustained very serious injuries. On account of his age, 72 years, it was doubtful from the outset if he would recover. Under the sad circumstances it was probably a happy release, but had misfortune not overtaken him he might have lived for another ten years and seen the fruits of his labor in Victoria Park, to say nothing of his caring for "Sunny Jim," the town's pet kangaroo.

All the townspeople paid their last respects to a soldier and a lover of horses, at the funeral, which was conducted by Mr. W. H. McIntosh, with military honors, to the Presbyterian cemetery at 4 o'clock on Monday afternoon last. The late Mr. Eadie, who has relatives in Victoria, was born at Sunbury in that State. He was one of the best-known racing men in this State and Victoria. He spent the major part of his life caring for stud sires in the two States. He had an inborn love for horses and was there ever a true lover of horses who was not a good man? He was well-known by all the owners of leading horse studs and he followed racing from A to Z. Betting, however, was his weakness. He probably had no regrets.

Mr. Eadie fought in the South African War and enlisted in the Great War, but the authorities thought he was too old for active service. Mr. Eadie thought otherwise and he found his way to the other side in charge of horses

for the troops. For the last seven or eight years prior to his appointment as caretaker at Victoria Park for the Municipal Council, he was stud groom for Messrs. P. M. and J. L. Bourke, at historic Cooma Cottage. He was a well educated man and was a member of the Veterinary Surgeons' Association of N.S.W. before the advent of university trained men. "He was a man who understood his job well," was the tribute paid to him on Monday morning by Mr. P. M. Bourke.

Mr. Eadie's work in Victoria Park, which was the subject of an article in the "Tribune-Courier" a few weeks ago, is recent history. Ald. Scot Dickson who collaborated with the late Mr. Eadie in all the good work he did at the Park, visited him at the Hospital on Sunday night and had a few words with him. Mr. Eadie regularly attended the Soldiers' Club, where he will be greatly missed. Flags at the Memorial Hall were flown at half-mast on Monday. An inquest concerning the death of William Aitken Eadie was formally opened at the Court House on Monday morning by the District Coroner, Mr. S. C. Sleeman, and adjourned till 2 o'clock on Friday afternoon.

James Fletcher, labourer, age 33, born at Oxley, Brisbane, Qld; Enl.20Aug1914 at Enoggera, Qld, with previous service in 10th Scottish Rifles; Emb.24Sep1914; to Gallipoli 02Mar1915; to hospital with enteric 20Aug1915; to France 08Jun1916; TOS 9Bn 29Jul1916; to L/Cpl ??; to T/Cpl 22Apr1917; awarded DCM 08May1917; to Cpl 13Aug1917; KIA 25Jun1918; Buried at Borre Military Cemetery, near Hazebrouck, France.

A report of the death of Cpl Fletcher by CQMS D.C.Fraser of 9Bn reads as follows:- Fletcher, Cpl of A. Co, was killed, but not outright, by Machine Gun bullet through the back which he received in front of Coy H.Q. near Strazeele Railway Station, which is to the right of Strazeele. He was taken to our Aid Post where I saw him. He spoke to those there - seemed cherry but the Doctor, Capt Grees, told me there was no hope of his recovery. He died at D/S at Borre and is buried at Borre Military Cemetery about 300 yards from the Church. A cross being erected. I saw his grave. He was very well liked and his wife has been written to.

Charles William Clanan Marr, wireless engineer with Commonwealth Government, age 36, born at Field of Mars (Ryde area), Sydney; qualified with Engineering honours at Sydney Technical College; Enl.01Apr1916 at rank of Captain, previous service School Cadets 7yrs, militia 18yrs, currently CO 18th Sig Trp Aust Engrs; Emb.30May1916 to Colombo and then to Bombay and then Basrah; appt Major and CO 1st Aust & NZ Wireless Sig Sqn 17Sep1916; 14Aug1917 Mention in Despatch of Gen T.S.Maudes; 25Aug1917 awarded Military Cross for distinguished service in the field in Mesopotamia, between Aug 29th 1916 & March 31st 1917; 21Apr1918 to Australia on leave; 26Jun1918 awarded DSO for distinguished service with military operations in Mesopotamia 03Jun1918; 15Apr1918 Mention in Despatch by Lt Gen W.R.Marshall for distinguished and gallant service and devotion to duty; RTA and remained in militia commanding the signals of the First Cavalry Division.

After his war service Charles Marr entered politics representing the Nationals, winning the seat of Parkes in December 1919. He was Government Whip (1921-22); Parliamentary Secretary to the Nationalists (1921-25); Honorary Minister in the Bruce-Page government (1925-27); Minister for Home and Territories (1927-28); Honorary Minister from February 1928 until the defeat of government October 1929. At the time of the election he was at the head of the Australian delegation to the League of Nations in Geneva and made frantic but unsuccessful efforts to return for the election campaign, even seeking the assistance of Charles Kingsford Smith to fly back. The sitting member for the seat was appointed to the High Court of Australia, so there was a by-election which Marr won in January 1931. He was Vice-President in 1924-25 and 1929-31 of the National Association of New South Wales and Vice-President of the Australian National Federation in 1928-31.

In the Lyons United Australia Party government, Marr held the portfolios of health, repatriation and territories during the years 1932-34. He served on the committees that organized the visits of the Prince of Wales (1920) and the Duke and Duchess of York (1927), so he was given charge of the Duke of Gloucester's tour in 1934 and in 1935 was appointed K.C.V.O. In the same year he was dropped from the ministry. In 1941-42 he was deputy chairman of the joint committee on broadcasting. He lost his seat in 1943 when a heart ailment restricted his campaigning.

Marr promoted the New Guinea Legislative Council, personally opening it in May 1933. He had substantial land holdings near Madang which were acquired in 1929 by Amalgamated Coffee Plantations (New Guinea) Ltd, a company he founded with (Sir) Walter Carpenter and others. Marr held several company directorships, including Tatua Gold, New Zealand Forest Products Ltd, Papuan Apinaipi Petroleum Co. Ltd and W. R. Carpenter & Co. Ltd, and was chairman of Mineral Development Ltd and Gold Development Ltd.

Charles Marr died on 20 October 1960 at Pymble at the age of 80 and was cremated after a state funeral at the Methodist Church, Gordon.

Recommendation: On the 8th August, 1918, during the operations on the Somme, Sergeant Greer's Platoon Commander became a casualty. This N.C.O. immediately took command of the Platoon, and with a small party of men he cleared up two large dugouts taking in all about 50 prisoners. On reaching the objective, in spite of heavy enemy Machine Gun fire, he personally established a forward Post. Throughout the operations he showed consummate skill in leadership and organisation, and inspired all by his untiring devotion to duty.

Citation: For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When his platoon commander became a casualty he took command and cleared out two large dugouts, taking about fifty prisoners. On reaching the final objective he established a forward machine-gun post in face of heavy machine-gun fire. His organising capacity and skilful leadership were a great asset.

J.J.Ryan, AAMC, gave a statement regarding the circumstances of his capture as follows:- 'At Retymo, Crete, two Australian battalions were defending the Aerodrome and on the morning of 31 May 1941 a battalion conference was held and the C.O. informed us that Col. Campbell, the Force Commander, had ordered that the battalion should surrender. He asked the opinion of the officers there and all the officers concurred in the decision that the position of the battalion was hopeless and it would be useless fighting any further. Col. Sandover (then Major) said that he himself intended taking to the hills and any member of the battalion who wished could do likewise. I accompanied Sandover with about 130 members of the battalion. We made our way to the southern part of the island, where we joined a large party consisting of R.A.F. personnel, British Naval people, Argyle and Southern Highlanders and members of the Black Watch regiment, making a total of about 500 men. For two days the Naval people signalled at night and even though the signals were recognised by

British bombers, nothing was done about picking us up. In the meantime, a party of Australian and English troops, led by Capt. Fitzharding, of the 2/3 Field Regiment, put into repair a motor landing craft that had been beached and was in disorder. They decided they could take 70 men and after a conference it was decided that the full party should set out for Egypt. I was not concerned in this party but they sent a message to Col Sandover saying they had kept a place for me and Col. Sandover gave me the order to go. We set off at 2000 hours on 2 June. At 0200 hours on 3 June we sighted a submarine. We at first thought it was a British submarine but it opened fire with machine guns and a 40 inch naval gun. Capt. Fitzharding surrendered the craft. The Italians then came close and asked Capt. Fitzharding to swim across to them and after a while he sang out that he wanted the eight officers to come on board the craft. Some of them swam over and in doing so one - Lieut. Gill of the South African Air Force - was drowned. I informed them at this stage that I was a medical officer and had wounded on board and asked did they want me to come across. They said they did. By this time the submarine had tied up to the craft and I went on board. We were taken down below and searched. They asked me about the wounded on the landing barge and I gave them an exaggerated account but they just walked off and left us. Seven other officers and myself were on board the submarine. I understand the rest of the party left on the landing barge got back to Egypt safely. I was taken to Taranto, Italy.'

Citation: This officer displayed most conspicuous bravery and self-sacrificing devotion on 20th March 1944, during the fighting at Cassino. He was proceeding into Cassino when two soldiers stopped him, and informed that there was a wounded man laying the opposite side of the Rapido River; and that as he was in the middle of a minefield no help could be got to him. The conditions then were that the area was under constant and intense artillery, mortar, and nebelwerfer fire; and that both sides of the river were known to be extensively mined, including anti-personnel devices.

Having seen by reconnaissance where the casualty lay, Major O'Dowd crossed the first lot of mines and reached the river, carrying with him a stretcher and dressings. He then directed a stretcher bearer to follow his route. Making his way by the river, this officer came opposite the wounded man; and landed and again entered the minefield. Making his way through some 70 - 100 yards of this minefield by using shell holes, Major O'Dowd reached the casualty; and also succeeded in getting his assistant there.

The dressing of the wounded man took some twenty minutes, the whole time under intense enemy fire. Major O'Dowd with his assistant then carried back the casualty by the route which he had come; and in spite of the fire and other hazards finally reached comparative safety. The whole of this action took some two hours to perform, and no words can describe the grim and dangerous conditions under which Major O'Dowd performed this rescue operation. The casualty could not have lived much longer without the medical attention then given him.

The sheer cold-blooded heroism and devotion displayed by Major O'Dowd in performing this most brave act are worthy of the highest praise; and in carrying it out, he knew full well that the chances of his own survival were slight.

Francis John O'Dowd was an Australian doctor who served with distinction in World War II and then went to Jersey in 1947 to take over the medical practice of Dr Coutts who was retiring. He was also Divisional Surgeon of the Boy Cadets of St John Ambulance and was on duty at the Bel Royal corner in Jersey during a high speed road race practice session. Driver K.W. Bear was practising in his Bugatti on 27 April 1949 when it left the promenade at 100 MPH, when it failed to take a hairpin bend and crashed through a safety barrier with several people seriously injured and the driver, a policeman and Dr O'Dowd killed.
